	GIST:	During the early morning hours of Thursday, December 6, 1984, the two arrested subjects, John Thompson and Kevin Freeman, were cruising the St. Charles Ave. area in Freeman's 1974 Chevrolet Monto Carlo with the intention of locating and robbing a wealthy resident. Shortly after midnight, Freeman parked his vehicle at the intersection of Dryades and Josephine, and the two alighted from the vehicle and began walking down Josephine St., toward St. Charles Ave. Upon reaching the intersection of Baronne St. and Josephine, Thompson and Freeman observed the victim, Ray T. Liuzza, parking his silver BMW automobile across the street from his apartment complex in the 1700 block of Josephine St. As Thompson and Freeman continued their trek, Ray Liuzza got out of his vehicle and					
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		<p>walked across Josephine St., toward the rear gate of his complex. As Ray Liuzza approached the gate, Thompson pulled a Taurus .357 magnum blue steel revolver and walked up to Liuzza. Thompson pointed the weapon at Liuzza and ordered him to relinquish his property. Mr. Liuzza submitted to the robbery and peacefully supplied Thompson with his wallet, his wristwatch, and his gold initial ring. As he handed over each article, Mr. Liuzza pleaded with Thompson not to shoot him. At some point during these actions, Kevin Freeman became frightened and fled the scene, running back to his vehicle. Just as he reached his Chevrolet, Freeman heard a volley of shots fired from the location of the robbery. A short time later, Freeman spoke with John Thompson who informed him that he had completed the robbery by shooting the victim. Freeman verified the occurrence via media accounts of the incident. Articles of property stolen in the robbery were later sold by Thompson to a buyer, from whom it was recovered by police during an investigation.</p> <p>NARRATIVE:</p> <p>Det. Donald James Curole, assigned to Car 3345 of the Homicide Division, respectfully reports of receiving notification from Det. Curole arrived at the Accident Room of Charity Hospital where he met with Det. Cyril Davillier. The Dets. then interviewed Head Nurse Susan Cummings, who advised that the victim had already been transported to surgery, and was now listed in critical condition with multiple gunshot wounds. Both physicians who initially treated the victim were in surgery with him, and were unavailable for interview. Miss Cummings provided no further information on the condition of the victim at this time.</p> <p>At 2:15 AM, Dets. Donald Curole and Cyril Davillier met with Officers Clyde Angelo and David Carter, assigned to Car 612 of the Sixth District, who had conducted the initial scene investigation. These officers stated that on Thursday, December 6, 1984 at 12:43 AM, they responded to an emergency broadcast of a shooting from 2103 Baronne St. Upon arrival, at 12:44 AM, Officers Angelo and Carter observed the victim, later identified as Ray T. Liuzza, WM, 12-3-50, lying in the grass next to the building at 1745 Josephine St., near the intersection of Baronne St. Mr. Liuzza was conscious when the officers located him, and briefly told them that he had been robbed, and that the robber told him he was going to shoot him. Mr. Liuzza then refused to provide the officers with further details of the incident, instead insisting that they transport him to</p>

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		<p>the incident, instead insisting that they transport him to the hospital in their patrol car.</p> <p>At 12:48 AM, Unit 1806, manned by Emergency Medical Tech's Riggs and Daggs, arrived on the scene and administered first aid to the victim. At 12:55 AM, the EMT's placed Mr. Liuzza in the rear of their unit and transported him to the Accident Room of Charity Hospital for treatment. Officers Angelo and Carter were unsure of the number, or severity of the injuries, but believed that Mr. Liuzza had suffered multiple gunshot wounds to the chest and back.</p> <p>At 1:46 AM, Crime Scene Tech. Anthony Cusimano arrived on the scene and took the necessary photographs. Tech. Cusimano then retrieved two spent pellets, one of which penetrated the exterior wall of 1745 Josephine St, and the other which lodged in an interior hallway wall of the apartment at that address. This pellet had originally passed through the wooden entrance door before lodging in the hallway wall. A third pellet, which had also penetrated the exterior wall of 1745 Josephine St., could not be located. A detailed search of the area was conducted for additional evidence, but none was located. Tech. Cusimano later prepared a detailed report outlining his activities on the scene and itemizing the evidence collected. A copy of this report is now contained in the case file and is available for future reference.</p> <p>Upon completion of these tasks, Officers Angelo and Carter began interviewing residents of the neighborhood in an attempt to locate witnesses to the incident. The officers first interviewed Mr. Paul Schliffka WM, 4-27-62, residing 2026 Baronne St., Apt. 4. Mr. Schliffka told Officers Angelo and Carter that at approximately 12:40 AM, as he was getting into his vehicle, which was parked in front of his residence at 2026 Baronne St., he heard what sounded like several gunshots being fired around the corner of Josephine St. Upon looking up, Mr. Schliffka observed an unknown negro male running on Josephine, across Baronne st., in the direction of Dryades St. As the wanted subject ran across Baronne St., Mr. Schliffka could plainly see a dark colored long barreled revolver still clenched in his right hand. After the subject passed, Mr. Schliffka ran to the corner of Josephine and Baronne Sts. and watched the subject as he fled up Josephine to Dryades, and then unknown. Mr. Schliffka's attention was then drawn away from the fleeing suspect by the moans of Mr. Liuzza, who was lying wounded a few feet away in the grass. During an interview, Mr. Schliffka provided Officers Carter and Angelo with the following description of the suspect: Negro male, unknown age, 6' tall, slim build, dark complexion, close cut black hair, wearing a black jacket and blue jeans. This subject was armed with a large, blue steel revolver, with a long barrel, which he held in his right hand. This description was later broadcast by Officers Angelo and Carter to all units patrolling the area.</p>

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		<p>The officers then interviewed Miss Pamela Staab, WF, 4-27-62, residing 1745 Josephine St. Miss Staab stated that she was inside her apartment when she heard the victim, whom she knows and who's voice she recognized, telling someone to "take my watch". Miss Staab then heard another voice say "No man, I'm going to shoot you". Miss Staab then heard several shots fired, followed by the sound of someone running. Miss Staab did not look outside of her apartment during this time, and witnessed nothing. After hearing the shots fired, Miss Staab ran to her roommate and told her that someone had just robbed Ray. Miss Staab added nothing further during this interview.</p> <p>The officers then interviewed Miss Nora Mestayer, WF, 6-4-61, who resided with Miss Staab at 1745 Josephine St. Miss Mestayer told the officers that she was sleeping in her bedroom when she was awoken by the sound of loud voices outside her apartment. Miss Mestayer, still groggy from sleep, heard the voices for only a short time, and could not understand what was said. She then heard several gunshots fired. Miss Mestayer was in bed during this time, and did not witness what transpired outside of her apartment. Miss Mestayer provided no further information during this interview.</p> <p>The officers also interviewed Mr. Gerald Schreiber, WM, 8-24-49, who identified himself as a close friend of the victim. After supplying the victim's background information to the officers, Mr. Schreiber and Officer Angelo entered Mr. Liuzza's apartment in an attempt to ascertain what, if anything, was stolen from the victim during the robbery. Mr. Schreiber searched the apartment and was able to locate Mr. Liuzza's Rolex wristwatch, raising speculation that the Cartier wristwatch was the one stolen. Mr. Schreiber was unable to ascertain if anything else was missing.</p> <p>Following these interviews, Det. Curole accompanied Lt. Antoine Saacks of the Sixth District to the 1700 block of Josephine where he conducted a personal inspection of the scene. This building is a two story wood frame structure which was formally a double residence, but has since been subdivided into apartments. The building bears the address 2030 and 2032 Baronne St in front, and 1745 Josephine for the side apartment. This building is one of three remodeled former doubles which comprise the apartment complex. A continuous black wrought iron fence spans the entire frontal length of the complex, which faces Baronne St. Three separate entrance gates are located along this length, all of which are kept locked from the inside. At the back of the building located at 1745 Josephine St. is a small driveway capable of accomodating two or three vehicles. Beyond this driveway is a wooden fence, which secures the rear yard of the complex. To the extreme left is a gate, which affords access from the driveway to the rear yard. It should be noted that this area is very dark, with the only illumination provided by a single street light located in the 1700 block of Josephine St.</p>

<p>Mr. Liuzza's vehicle, a 1979 BMW 4 dr, color silver, bearing Louisiana License 169E973, was found parked in front of 1740 Josephine St., facing toward Baronne St. This location is across Josephine St., and slightly behind, the driveway and gate Mr. Liuzza normally used to enter the apartment grounds. This vehicle appeared undisturbed, and showed nothing to indicate that the incident commenced in this area.</p> <p>On the side of the residence at 1745 Josephine St., Det. Curole observed three bullet holes, which appeared to be spaced some distance apart. Two of these holes were located in weatherboards comprising the exterior facade of the building. The third bullet hole was located in the solid wooden entrance door to 1745 Josephine St. As previously mentioned, the bullet which penetrated the door, and one of the bullets which penetrated the exterior wall were recovered by Tech. Cusimano of the New Orleans Police Crime lab. However the third bullet, which also penetrated the exterior wall, was not located. It should be noted that the two holes which penetrate the weatherboards appear to the left of the hole which penetrated the wooden door, in the direction of Baronne St., proceeding further down the side of the building, Det. Curole observed a small pool of fresh blood in the grass adjacent to the building near the side of the front porch. Lt. Saacks indicated that this was the location where Officers Carter and Angelo found the victim lying when they arrived. No additional evidence, or points of interest, were located during this inspection of the scene. Upon completion of this task, Det. Curole departed the scene enroute to the Homicide Division Office.</p> <p>Upon returning to the Homicide Office at 3AM, Det. Curole was notified by Correctional Officer Mary Bell that the victim, Ray T. Liuzza had expired. Miss Bell explained that at 2:30 AM authorities at the Accident Room of Charity Hospital notified the Command Desk of the New Orleans Police Department, who relayed news of the death of Miss Bell. According to information received, Ray T. Liuzza was pronounced dead by Dr. Mark Valentine at Charity Hospital at 2:17 A.M. No further information was available at this time.</p> <p>Following this Det. Curole proceeded to the Communications Center of the New Orleans Police Department where he obtained a copy of the Computer Complaint History logged for this incident. This history indicated that the first notification was received at 12:42 AM from a person identified as Miss Cash, phone number 522-2178, who stated that someone had just been shot in the street. Supplemental notifications were received at 12:43 AM, the first from Miss Oholendt, residing 2026 Baronne St., Apt. phone 524-8103, who stated that she heard several gunshots and now hears a male yelling for help, and the last from Miss Khiel, phone 523-6131, who stated that she heard gunshots in the area and now sees a man down near the intersection. A printout of the complaint history is now included in the case file. Interviews with the three complainants will be conducted at a later date.</p>

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		<p>On Thursday, December 6, 1984 at 9AM, Det. Donald Curole proceeded to the Orleans Parish Coroner's Office where he viewed an autopsy performed on the remains of Ray T. Liuzza by Coroner's Pathologist Dr. Monroe Samuels M.D. Upon completion of this Post Mortem Examination, Dr. Samuels provided the following information pertaining to the wounds observed;</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. One gunshot wound to the right anterior chest, located in the lower Auxillary region along the lateral border of the right Pectoralis muscle, which penetrates the muscles of the right lateral aspects of the chest and exits immediately lateral to the right scapula. This wound is superficial and did not penetrate the chest cavity.</li> <li>2. One gunshot wound to the Postero-lateral aspect of the abdomen, left side, just above the Iliac crest which passed through multiple loops of the small intestine, the hepatic flexor of the colon, and the liver, before exiting at the costal margin of the anterior chest, just to the right of the midline.</li> <li>3. One gunshot entrance wound to the medial back, just to the right of the midline which penetrated the right lateral aspect of the vertebral column, the renal bed on the right side, the right lobe of the liver, and the diaphragm, before exiting at the lateral aspect of the right midchest.</li> <li>4. One gunshot wound to the medial back to the left of midline which passes through the soft tissues of the back without penetrating the chest cavity, with a corresponding exit wound to the right lateral abdomen, just above the iliac crest.</li> </ol> <p>This is also a superficial gunshot wound.</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>5. Gunshot entrance wound to the medial lower right buttock which passes through the soft tissues and muscles of the upper posterior thigh, with a corresponding exit wound to the antero-lateral right midthigh.</li> </ol> <p>It should be noted that each wound enumerated above corresponds with a numbered wound chart prepared by Dr. Samuels following the examination. This wound chart is now contained in the case file and is available for future reference. Also contained in the case file are copies of the Coroner's Office Day Record, and the Autopsy Protocol outlining the results of the previously described Post Mortem Examination.</p> <p>On Thursday, December 6, 1984 at 11AM, Det. Curole met and interviewed Miss Susan Steiner, WF, 9-6-57, residing 1207 Jackson Ave, in the Ave, in the offices of the Homicide Division. From there they proceeded to Lenfant's Restaurant located on Canal Blvd. where they met friends, identified as Pierre Villere and Patti Pulitzer, in the lounge. The couple remained in Lenfant's Lounge until about midnight, at which time they left and drove back to the 4141 Club on St. Charles Ave. As they drove up to the 4141 Club Miss Steiner decided not to go inside and requested that Mr. Liuzza driver her home. They then proceeded to her residence at 1207 Jackson Ave. After speaking inside Miss Steiner's apartment for a few minutes, Mr. Liuzza departed, enroute home. This was the last time Miss Steiner saw, or spoke to Mr. Liuzza. Miss Steiner informed Det. Curole also interviewed Mr. Pierre Villere, WM, 5-17-52, residing 1441 Jackson Ave, who had accompanied Miss Steiner to the Homicide Office. Mr. Villere informed the Det. that he and his date, identified as Patti Pulitzer, spent the evening with Ray Liuzza and Susan Steiner at the lounge located in Lenfant's Restaurant on Canal Blvd. Mr. Villere verified the information provided by Miss Steiner during her interview, and could add nothing further.</p> <p>On Friday, December 7, 1984 at 10:30 AM, Det. Curole reinterviewed Miss Pamela Staab, WF, 6-5-62, at her apartment at 1745 Josephine St. Miss Staab told Det. 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		<p>Miss Staab stated that from the sound of the voices, she believed that the robbery occurred just outside her bedroom window. Miss Staab continued that she distinctly heard the voice of her neighbor, Ray T. Liuzza, saying rather excitedly "Please go ahead, take my watch", and "here you can have my wallet". Miss Staab described Liuzza as "very insistent" in telling the person to take his property. She then heard another man's voice, whom she did not recognize, say "I've got to shoot you", or words to that affect. She then heard a volley of shots fired in rapid succession, but was unsure of the exact amount fired. Miss Staab then heard what sounded like someone running, but was unsure of which direction. After hearing this sequence of events, Miss Staab got out of bed and ran to her roommate, identified as Nora Mestayer, who was sleeping in her bedroom located in the rear of the apartment. When she reached her roommate she exclaimed "someone had just shot Ray". Later, during the scene investigation, officers entered her apartment and located a spent pellet, which was lodged in her bedroom wall, just above where her head was positioned as she slept. Miss Mestayer, who is Miss Staab's roommate, stated that she also was awoken by the sound of loud voices outside of her apartment, but was unable to understand what was being said. Shortly thereafter she heard a rapid series of shots fired, followed by the sound of someone running. Miss Mestayer stated immediately after that Miss Staab entered her room and informed her that Ray Liuzza had been shot. Miss Mestayer could add nothing further during this interview.</p> <p>At 11:30 AM, Det. Curole met and interviewed Mr. Paul Schliffka, WM, 4-27-62, at his residence at 2026 Baronne St., Apt. 4. Mr. Schliffka stated that he had just walked from his apartment and was in the process of entering his vehicle, which was parked at the curb, when he heard four shots fired around the corner on Josephine St. Upon looking up Mr. Schliffka observed a negro male subject running across Baronne St., and then continuing down Josephine St. toward Dryades St. As this man crossed Baronne St., Mrs. Schliffka plainly observed a large, blue steel, long barreled revolver still clenched in his right hand. Mr. Schliffka described this man as a negro male, early 20's, 6' tall, slim build, dark complexion, close cut hair, wearing a black nylon jacket and dark pants, possibly blue jeans. Mr. Schliffka saw this man only from the side for a short period of time as he ran across Baronne St., and was unsure if he could recognize him again. After seeing this man run across Baronne St., Mr. Schliffka walked to the corner of Josephine and Baronne and watched as the perpetrator ran up the sidewalk, on the downtown side of Josephine St., toward Dryades. 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<p>He then turned around and found Mr. Liuzza lying in the grass a short distance away. Upon realizing that Mr. Liuzza was seriously wounded, Mr. Schlifka ran to the front of his apartment and yelled for his roommate to notify the police, which she did. Mr. Schlifka had no further information to contribute to this investigation.</p> <p>At 3PM, Friday, December 7, 1984, Det. Donald Curole proceeded to the International Hotel, 300 Canal St., where he met and interviewed Mr. Bill Brown, Asst. General Manager, and Mr. Ay A. Liuzza, who is the father of the victim and President of the Hotel. The two men supplied Det. Mr. Michael's sold the watch to the victim some years ago and maintained records on all transactions.</p> <p>Mr. Liuzza went onto say that his son had been employed at the Hotel for about five years, and had just been promoted to Vice President of the Hotel a week prior to his death. Ray T. Liuzza was close friends with Mr. Frank Macelli, who owned and operated the apartment complex on Baronne St., where he lived for the past five to six years. Mr. Liuzza had no recollection of his son encountering any problems at his residence during the time he resided there. Mr. Liuzza described his son as a gentle man who would have submitted to a robbery attempt without expressing hostility or resistance. Mr. Liuzza had nothing further to add during this conversation.</p> <p>On Saturday, December 8, 1984 between the hours of 12 noon and 4PM, Dets. Curole and Demma conducted a supplemental canvass of the area surrounding the scene. During this canvass, the following people were interviewed:</p> <p>Miss Sheri Hartman, WF, 9-24-49, 2031 Baronne St. Heard six gunshots which prompted her to look out of her second floor window. Upon doing so she observed a blonde haired male kneeling over a man who was lying in the grass next to the corner building. Again he mentioned that the sterling silver chain on which this medal was once attached, was still missing. Nothing further was learned during this interview.</p> <p>At 8PM, Dets. Curole and Demma proceeded to the Property and Evidence Division where they turned over one pair of grey pin striped pants containing bullet holes and blood stains over to Officer R. Huber. Receipt control number A74293 was issued for this evidence. A copy of this document is now contained in the case file.</p> <p>On Sunday, December 9, 1984, at 4PM, Det. Curole interviewed Miss Patti Pulitzer, WF, 9-13-43, residing 1002 Webster St. Miss Pulitzer identified herself as a close friend of the victim and informed the investigators that she was with Pierre Villere, along with Ray Liuzza and his girlfriend, Susan Steiner at Lenfant's prior to the murder. Miss Pulitzer stated that Liuzza left Lenfant's with Miss Steiner at about midnight. Just prior to leaving, Mr. Liuzza mentioned that he was fatigued, and intended to proceed straight home. 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<p>At 5:30 PM, Det. Curole and Demma interviewed Mr. Cris Braiwick, WM, 12-11-55, at his residence at 813 Hildigo St. Mr. Braiwick, who identified himself as Liuzza's best friend, told Det. Curole that Liuzza used "cocaine" recreationally", but was very discreet in its use. According to Braiwick, Liuzza would only use cocaine when the drug was offered to him, by friends, at social gatherings. Liuzza never purchased the narcotic, and had no regular connection for the purchase of the drug. Following this, Mr. Braiwick provided a detailed description of the jewelry taken from Mr. Liuzza during the robbery. Mr. Braiwick added nothing further during this conversation.</p> <p>On Monday, December 10, 1984 at 10AM, Dets. Curole and Demma proceeded to the New Orleans Police Crime Lab where they spoke with Ballistics Examiner Otho Stubbs. Det. Stubbs indicated that he examined the two spent pellets which were recovered from the scene of the murder and found that both were fired from the same weapon. According to Det. Stubbs the family characteristics observed during this examination was consistent with either a Smith &amp; Wesson, Ruger, or Taurus brand revolver. This weapon could be either a .38 or .357 caliber. Det. Stubbs speculated however, from evidence collected thusfar, that the weapon most probably was a .357 caliber. Before concluding this conversation, Det. Stubbs informed the investigators that the two pellets were in excellent condition which rendered them suitable for comparison should a suspect weapon be recovered.</p> <p>At 3PM, Monday, December 10, 1984, Dets. Curole and Demma proceeded to Adler's Jewelers on Canal St., where they met with Mr. Schiffer Michaels. Mr. Michaels informed the Dets. that he researched his files and found that Liuzza purchased a Cartier Tank wristwatch in 1975 articles as a small thin wristwatch with a square face outlined in gold, containing black roman numerals. The watch also had an sapphire mounted on the stem, and a black leather band. A serial number, inscribed on the back of the watch, consisted of the digets 5C which was followed by four additional numerals. Mr. Michaels was unable to provide the full serial number due to incomplete records. Mr. Michaels further stated that his records did not reflect the purchase of the ring described by Liuzza's family from his establishment. It should be noted that in a later interview with Cris Braiwick, Dets. learned that this ring was purchased by Mr. Liuzza from an unidentified antique shop located somewhere in the French Quarter. Mr. Michaels also provided the investigators with a photograph depicting a watch similar to the one stolen from Mr. Liuzza. No additional information was collected during this interview.</p> <p>At 4PM, Dets. Curole and Demma proceeded to Baptist Hospital where they met and interviewed Miss Jody Beauregard, WF, 3-9-56, residing 546 Jefferson Ave. Miss Beauregard, who identified herself as Liuzza's former girlfriend, was reportedly very close to him. Miss Beauregard possessed no information pertinent to the incident, but did supply</p>						
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		<p>valuable background information on the victim. Miss Beauregard also indicated that she was capable of rendering an artists conception of the gold block ring taken from Mr. Liuzza during the robbery. Before concluding this interview, Det. Curole made arrangements for an artists to meet with Miss Beauregard.</p> <p>At 9PM, Monday, December 10, 1984, Det. Sam Gebbia of the Homicide Division met with Miss Jody Beauregard at the residence of Miss Patti Pultzer, 1002 Webster St. As a result of this meeting, Det. Gebbia was able to prepare a sketch of the ring Mr. Liuzza wore at the time of the robbery. A copy of this sketch is now contained in the case file.</p> <p>On Tuesday, December 11, 1984, Mr. Ray A. Liuzza held a news conference during which he informed the media of the existance of a reward fund, totaling \$15,000.00 dollars, which had been posted for the arrest and convictions of the murdered of Ray T. Liuzza. The provisions of this fund stipulated that half the amount would be awarded to the person or persons who provided information leading to the arrest of the person responsible, with the remaining half awarded at the time of this persons conviction. This fund was to be administered by Mr. Joseph Maselli Jr., Attorney at Law, who is also a close friend of the family. A notarized copy of the document listing the amount of the reward, and the terms by which it would be administered, is now contained in the case file and is available for future reference.</p> <p>Following this news release, posters announcing the reward were prepared and distributed in the area of the murder. Articles concerning this reward fund were published in the local newspapers, and stories aired by local radio and television stations. In hppe of soliciting the information which would identify whomever was responsible for this crime.</p> <p>On December 12, 1984, Det. Curole contacted and interviewed the three people who notified police of the incident on the night the murder occured. The first person interviewed was Miss Kanpice Oholendt, WF, 8-27-45, who is the roommate of Paul Schliffka. Miss Oholendt stated that she was in the front room of her apartment when she heard a gunshot, and then a pause followed by three additional gunshots. She then stepped onto her balcony, which overlooks Baronne St., at which time she observed a black male, 25 years of age, medium build, dark jacket, dark pants, running across Baronne St., carrying a gun in his right hand. Following this, Paul Schliffka yelled to her that someone had been shot, and ordered her to call the police, which she did. Miss Oholendt informed the investigators that she only saw the fleeing suspect from the rear, and would be unable to identify him.</p> <p>Dets. next interviewed Miss Charon Kiehl, WF, 6-4-54, residing 2103 Baronne St., Apt. 5. Miss Kiehl stated that she was in her kitchen when she heard five gunshots fired in rapid succession. She then ran to her bedroom window and peered out, observing a tall slim black man with a</p>

Since this interview was conducted Miss Kiehl has spoken to Paul Schlifka, and now believes that it was he she boserved kneeling over the body.</p> <p>The third complaninant, Miss Rosemary Cash, had been interviewed earlier in this investigation with the information collected recorded in a prior portion of this report.</p> <p>During the course of this investigation, Dets. assigned to the Criminal Investigation Bureau of the New Orleans Police Department received and recorded a vast amount of information identifying a myriad of suspects in the murder of Ray T. Liuzza. Additional information was received from other law enforcement agencies as well as the friends and family of the victim. Most of this information was received from people who telephoned the authorities with their information, but expressed a wish to remain anonymous. Some information was collected from people who identified themselves and cooperated in the ongoing investigation. In each case where information identifying a certain suspect was received, an investigation was conducted to ascertain that persons culpability in this matter. It should be noted that none of these investigations resulted in the identification of Ray Liuzza's killer, and most resulted in the elimination of the person named as a suspect in this crime. The perponderance the scope of this report, and therefore not included. However, this information was recorded, and retained for future reference should this be required.</p> <p>Two pieces of information obtained via the Crimestoppers Hotline during this investigation ultimately assisted the investigators in identifying the killer's of Ray T. Liuzza.</p> <p>The first tip was received on the Crimestopper's Hotline by Det. Vivian Williams on Monday, December 31, 1984 at 10:30 AM. This caller, a black male who remained anonymous, identified John Thompson, NM, 23, alais "nut", residing 1302 Simon Bolivar, and Kevin Freeman, Nm, 23, alais Kojak, residing 2220 Felicity as the people involved in this killing. The caller described Thompson as a negro male, 23 years old, 6' tall, 130 lbs with short black hair, and Freman as a negro male, 23 years old, years old, 6' tall, 130 lbs. The claler further stated that Thompson actually robbed and shot Liuzza while Freeman waited in the vehicle, described as a 1975 or 1976 Chevrolet 2 door, black over burgundy. The caller who provided no additional information, was assigned identification number # 292, and the information recorded on a Crimestoppers questionnaire, which was forwarded to Det. Curole for investigation.</p> <p>The second tip was also received via the Crimestopper's Hotline by Det. Williams on Friday, January 4, 1985 at 2:55 PM. This caller, who identified himself as Ken Carr, residing 1540 St. Mary St., Apt. A,</p>

Williams that while seated in a bar located at Felicity and Saratoga, on 12-31-84, he overheard a conversation between two men who were seated next to him. One of the men, whom he identified as John, alias "NUT" or "NOOKIE", NM, 6' tall, 120 lbs, was heard to say he didn't want to kill him, but he was about to turn me over. The second man then said "John, don't crack on me". Mr. Carr provided no further information, but stated he would arrive home from work at 4:30 PM and requested an interview with the detectives investigating this case. Det. Williams assigned identification number #295 to Mr. Carr, and then recorded the information on a Crimestoppers Questionnaire which she forwarded to Det. Curole for investigation.</p> <p>It should be noted that original copies of these questionnaires are now contained in the case file and are available for future reference.</p> <p>At 5:30 PM, Friday, January 4, 1985, Dets. Curole and Demma proceeded to 1540 St. Mary, Apt. A, where they met and interviewed Mr. Kenneth Patrick Carr, NM, 9-23-60. Mr. Carr, who is employed at Sallara's Parking Garage, 721 Iberville St., told the investigators that while seated in Harry's Bar, located at Felicity and Saratoga, at about 1:30 AM, January 1, 1985, he overheard a conversation between two men who were seated near him. The initial portion of this conversation was inaudible, but then he heard one man say to the other "why did you shoot him". The second man then replied "Man, I didn't know the man's people had that kind of money, and there is a big reward out". He then mentioned that he had to kill the victim because he attempted to overpower him. The first man then remarked that he knew there was a lot of heat on the street, but to keep cool, and not to crack on him. Mr. Carr then asked someone in the bar if they knew the man, and they replied that his name was Nookie. Later Mr. Carr learned that his real name was John. According to Mr. Carr he had never met this man, and hadn't seen him before that night in the bar. Mr. Carr also did not recognize the man that "John" was speaking to. Before leaving the bar, Mr. Carr observed another man approach John and speak to him for a few minutes. At the end of this conversation the man stepped back and shouted "Hey man, don't fuck with me. I know what you did". Mr. Carr did not know the identity of the man that shouted, or the man that "John had spoken with earlier. Mr. Carr described John as "real uptight and nervous" during these conversations. Before ending this interview, Dets. Curole and Demma made arrangements for Mr. Carr to render a formal statement of his knowledge.</p> <p>Following this interview, Dets. Curole and Demma searched through accumulated information received via the Crimestopper's hotline, and located the questionnaire identifying John Thompson and Kevin Freeman as the perpetrators. Dets. Curole and Demma then checked both names through the Motion Computer System and located a criminal history on a John Thompson, NM, 9-6-62, residing at the stated address of 1302 Simon Bolivar.</p>

After carefully viewing each photo of the first lineup Mr. Carr tentatively identified the photo of John Thompson as the man he observed in the bar making statements he believed were connected with the murder of Ray Liuzza. <p>On Sunday, January 13, 1985 at 4:30 PM, Det. Ronald Brink of the Homicide Division received a telephone call from Mr. Frank Maselli, who is the owner of the property where Mr. Liuzza resided. Mr. Maselli told Det. Brink that at about 4PM, Sunday, January 13, 1985, a negro male subject was observed attempted to enter a locked iron gate in front of the apartment complex where Liuzza resided. The manager of the apartment complex, Angie Poisson, opened her front door after hearing the iron gate rattling and asked the negro male who he was looking for, The man replied "Angie, I'm looking for you". The subject then informed Miss Poisson that he knew who killed Liuzza and wanted to tell the family what he knew. Following this conversation, Miss Poisson telephoned Mr. Maselli, who subsequently related the information to Det. Brink. After speaking to Mr. Maselli, Det. Brink contacted Det. Demma and informed him of the conversation.</p> <p>At 4:40 PM, Det. Demma telephoned Angie Poisson who related the following information. At about 4PM Miss Poisson heard someone rattling the iron gate outside her apartment. Miss Poisson opened the front door of her apartment and found a negro male subject attempting to open the iron gate leading to the complex. She then asked the negro male who he was looking for and he replied "I'm looking for you Angie". Miss Poisson told Det. Demma that she did know this man, but was not surprised because many people in that neighborhood know of her. The subject told Miss Poisson that he knew who killed Ray Liuzza. He told Miss Poisson that he was scared and could not stand outside for long, for fear he might be seen talking to her. He then asked Miss Poisson if she knew how to get in touch with Liuzza's family because he wanted to tell them personally who the killer was. Miss Poisson promised to get in touch with Liuzza's family, and then gave the negro male her phone number and asked him to call her back. Afterthis, the negro male left. Det. Demma then advised Miss Poisson to contact him the moment this man telephoned her.</p> <p>At 6PM Miss Poisson contacted Det. Demma and informed him that the man had telephoned her at about 5:20 PM. Duirng this conversation the man advised Miss Poisson that he knew the identify of the two men that murdered Liuzza, and that both men lived in the area. The caller went onto say that both subjects robbed Mr. Liuzza, and that during the robbery one of the men shot the victim. When the first man startting shooting, the other robber fled the scene on foot. The caller then informed Miss Poisson that the man that shot Liuzza stold his wallet, which contained several credit cards but no money, a watch, and a ring. He continued that the man that shot Liuzza was now planning to kill his accomplice because he was afraid he would talk. This killing was scheduled to occur on New Years Eve., but for some unknown reason it did not take place.</p> <p>While Miss Poisson was talking with the negro male a negro female picked up the phone and identified herself as the mother of the caller.</p>

		<p>This woman told Miss Poisson that her son was telling the truth about the murder of Liuzza. This woman indicated that her son was very scared because the person responsible for the murder knew her son would be able to identify them. The information he possessed had caused the woman's son to take ill, and prevented him from eating or sleeping. Because he was uncomfortable with this information, he ultimately decided to tell Liuzza's family what he knew. Miss Poisson then asked the man why he didn't want to give this information to the police investigating the incident. He replied that he had spoken to Homicide Detectives, but they believed he was only interested in the reward and was not telling the truth. He then advised Miss Poisson that he would call back to ascertain if she had arranged a meeting for him with Liuzza's family. He then hung up.</p> <p>On Monday, January 14, 1985 at 11:58 AM, Miss Poisson again contacted Det. Demma and informed him that she was again contacted by the negro male at approximately 11:50 AM. During this telephone conversation the caller informed Miss Poisson that he intended to meet with Mr. Liuzza's family at the International Hotel at 4PM this date. Donald Curole and Marco Demma, in company with Det. Charles Folmer, met with Mr. Bill Brown at the International Hotel. During this time Mr. Brown was equipped with the electronic surveillance device, and the office, where the meeting was to occur, equipped with a cassette tape recorder.</p> <p>At 4:20 PM, Mr. Brown was advised by personnel at the front desk that a man was now in the lobby asking to see Mr. Liuzza. Mr. Brown then proceeded to the lobby and escorted this man to Mr. Liuzza's office. 		<p>The man, later identified as Richard Perkins, Alais "FUNK" agreed to this arrangement and began telling Mr. Brown that two firends of his were involved in the robbery, but only one shot Mr. Liuzza. He then stated that these two people told him of the incident, and would kill him if they found out he was telling someone what he knew. He also mentioned that the triggerman intended to shoot his accomplice because he left him alone during the commission of the robbery.</p> <p>Perkins said the two men, whom he refused to name, attempted to set him up, but did not elaborate. He further stated that they also set up another friend by selling him the gun used in the killing, along with the ring and watch that were taken during the robbery. He told Mr. Brown that the perpetrators did not get any money, and ultimately sold the property to acquire cash. He identified the peroperty stolen as a ring, a watch, and a wallet that contained four credit cards, but no money.</p> <p>Perkins dewcribed the gun as a 35 mangum or a 45 mangum, he did not remember which. He then admitted that the perpetrator gave him the gun after the shooting and asked him to sell it for him, which he did. Perkins indicated that at the time of this sale, he did not know that the gun was involved in any crime. He also indicated that he knew the identity of the man he sold the weapon to, and that this perosn still had the gun. He would not identify the two perpetrators by name, but indicated that they both live in the area, one with his grandmother. He said that both men were scared, and no longer come out of their homes after dark.</p> <p>After this Perkins told Mr. Brown that a friend, Whom he identified as an insurance man, recorded all of the information pertaining to the crime on paper. He indicated that this man intended to meet with Mr. Liuzza, at which time he would present him with this information. Perkins ended the conversation by informing Mr. Brown that he would leave to meet his friend, who got off of work at 5PM, after which they would return to the hotel and speak with Mr. Liuzza.</p> <p>Before concluding the meeting, Mr. Brown asked Perkins if he would give him his name. Perkins responded by identify himself as "RICHARD", after which he informed Mr. Brown that he also uses the moniker of "FUNK". Mr. Brown then asked him if he would be willing to provide him with his Social Security number for identification purposes. The record also listed Perkins social security number, which matched the one Mr. Brown recorded from the social security card present by Perkins at the meeting.</p> <p>At 8:30 PM, Monday, January 14, 1985, Mr. Brown received a telephone call from Richard Perkins, who contacted him at the hotel. Perkins advised him that he and his friend would arrive at the hotel at 9:30 PM, and demanded to meet with Mr. Liuzza. Perkins indicated that the meeting would have to take place at the time, and under the circumstances he specified, or else he would divulge nothing. After arranging the meeting with Mr. Liuzza, Mr. Brown contacted Dets. Curole and Demma who returned to the hotel along with Det. Charles Folmer, who installed the equipment alluded to earlier.</p> <p>At 9:40 PM, Richard Perkins and his friend, who identified himself as Gregory Dawson, arrived at the Internation Hotel and met with Mr. Bill Brown and Mr. Ray A. Liuzza. During this meeting Perkins identified the triggerman as John Thompson, and his accomplice as Kevin Freeman, alais Kojak. Perkins said that the two were out cruising the street looking for someone to rob when they happened upon Liuzza. Believing that he carried a lot of money because he was well dressed and lived in a fashionable neighborhood they decided to rob him. Both Thompson and Freeman were initially involved in the robbery, but Freeman apparently had second thoughts and left Thompson before he completed the act. Freeman ran to his vehicle, which he described as a 1975 Monte Carlo , color burgundy, and drove off. Before departing, Freeman heard the gunshots Thompson fired as he murdered Liuzza. Perkins repeated that Thompson stole a watch, a ring, and a wallet containing credit cards but no money from the victim during the robbery.</p> <p>Perkins described both Thompson and Freeman as friends of his. Following the incident, both Thompson and Freeman told Perkins about the robbery. Thompson told him that Liuzza was going to grab the gun, which forced him to shoot. Three days after the robbery, Thompson gave Perkins a gun which he asked him to sell for him. He described the gun as a large black pistol with brown wooden handles. He later sold the gun to a man known to him as J.R., who still has the weapon in his possession. Thompson also gave the other property, the ring and the watch, to other people to sell to J.R.</p> <p>Freeman told Perkins that they were out looking for someone to rob and that he knw that Thompson had the gun, but didn't think that he would shoot anyone. They purposely cruised the St. Charles Ave. area looking for a white man to rob because they believed the people in that area were rich and carried a lot of cash. When he realized that Thompson intended to shoot Liuzza, he left him and ran to his vehicle.</p>

<p>As he reached his automobile, he heard several gunshots, at which time he entered his vehicle and drove away. Freeman later expressed a suspicious that Thompson now intended to kill him to keep him from telling the police about the robbery.</p> <p>Perkins also told Mr. Brown that he called Crimestoppers twice and relayed this information to Det. Williams, but refused to provide his name. At the end of this meeting, Perkins indicated he would be willing to meet with Homicide Detectives and tell them what he knew, as long as he remained anonymous. Following this the meeting was concluded.</p> <p>It should be noted that each of the two meetings between Richard Perkins and Bill Brown were clandestinely recorded. The cassette tapes on which these meetings were recorded were marked as evidence, and are now contained in the case file.</p> <p>On Wednesday, January 16, 1985 at 10AM, Mr. Bill Brown contacted Det. Curole in the Homicide Office and advised him that he had recently spoken to Richard Perkins, and that a meeting had been arranged for 1:30 PM at the International Hotel. During this conversation, Perkins indicated that he would be willing to speak to the detectives investigating the incident during the meeting.</p> <p>At 1:43 PM, Mr. Bill Brown met with Richard Perkins and Gregory Dawson in the lobby of the International Hotel and escorted them to Room 428 where Dets. 		<p>the remaining photographs.</p> <p>Following this identification, mr. Perkins provided a narrative of the information he possessed. He began by saying that three days after the murder, on a Sunday at about 4 or 5PM, he met with John Thompson at his residence. The two then walked to a park located on Martin Luther King Blvd which is where Thompson first mentioned the pistol. When Thompson asked Perkins if he knew anyone that wanted to buy a gun, Perkins asked him what was wrong with it. Thompson replied that he had loaned it to a friend and that this friend had shot someone with it during a robbery. Thompson then suggested that they offer the weapon to J.R. Thompson told Perkins that the two of them would walk to J.R.'s apartment, with Perkins going inside to make the sale while he waited outside. The two walked to Thompson's mother's residence in the Melpomene Project where Thompson acquired the weapon. Perkins described the pistol as a big black handgun with brown handles, on which there was a symbol containing the head of a bull and the word "Taurus ". He further described the weapon as a .357 caliber, or a .45 caliber.</p> <p>After Thompson presented Perkins with the unloaded revolver they walked to J.R.'s apartment, which was also in the Project. Perkins entered the apartment alone and sold the weapon to J.R. for \$75.00 dollars, a bag of marijuana, and "a bag of tea". Following this transaction, Perkins exited the apartment and met with Thompson, who was waiting in a Project hallway on Thalia St. During a brief meeting, Perkins turned all of the proceeds from the transaction over to Thompson, after which they departed for their respective destinations. At the time of this occurrence Perkins noticed a change in Thompson's behavior which led him to believe Thompson "had something on his mind". He maintained however that he had no knowledge of Thompson's involvement in the crime at this point.</p> <p>A couple of days after the sale of the weapon, Perkins watched a television newscast which provided some details of the murder of Ray T. Liuzza. After viewing this newscast, Perkins began suspecting Thompson of being involved in the killing and further believed that the weapon he sold to Jr. was the murder wapon. A short time after this newscast, Perkins learned that Thompson had been arrested for "an attachment". It should be noted that New Orleans Police Department records reflect that John Thompson was arrested at the intersection of Dryades and Terpsichore on Wednesday, December 12, 1984 at 6:45 PM on an outstanding warrant. This arrest occurred approximately twenty four hours after the news media broadcast a report offering a \$15,000.00 dollar reward for information leading to the arrest of the person responsible for the murder of Ray Liuzza. Thompson subsequently gained his release by posting a security bond on Tuesday, December 18, 1984.</p>

		<p>Three days prior to Thompson's release, Perkins had a conversation with Kevin Freeman in which Freeman confessed to the robbery. Freeman stated that Thompson had come to his residence and began speaking of his intentions to rob someone. The pair then entered Freeman's Monte Carlo and began cruising the area surrounding St. Charles Ave. "because they knew some rich people lived around there". Eventually Freeman parked his vehicle in front of Katie's Beauty Salon located in the 1800 block of Josephine St., near the corner of Dryades. From there the two began walking down Josephine St., toward St. Charles. When they reached the intersection of Baronne and Josephine Sts., they observed Liuzza park his vehicle on Josephine St., and then began walking toward the driveway of his complex. According to Freeman, Thompson then decided to rob Liuzza "because he was white, and was wearing a nice suit". So the pair walked up to Liuzza and Thompson pulled his gun on him. According to Freeman, as Liuzza handed over his property he continually begged Thompson not to shoot him. At this point Freeman became frightened suspecting that Thompson due to his narcotic induced intoxication would shoot Liuzza. He then ran from the scene, while the robbery was still in progress, and returned to his parked automobile. When he arrived at his vehicle, Freeman heard a series of gunshots fired, after which he entered his car and drove away, leaving Thompson behind.</p> <p>On the day John Thompson was released from prison, later identified as December 18, 1984, he spent the night at Perkins' residence. During a conversation, Perkins mentioned that Freeman accused him of killing Liuzza. With this Thompson replied "man that nigger still running his mouth", after which he threatened to kill Freeman. Thompson then admitted he killed Liuzza and related the following sequence of events. After proceeding to Freeman's residence, the two got into Freeman's car and began looking for someone to rob. After Freeman parked the car, Thompson told Freeman that if they walked down that way (meaning toward St. Charles Ave) they would meet one of the rich people who lived there. As they walked down Josephine, Thompson observed the victim parking his car. Thompson then decided to rob this man because he "was white, and well dressed, and had money". Thompson told Perkins that the robbery occurred by the driveway at the end of the building. After pulling his pistol on Liuzza, he began giving Thompson his property, which consisted of a watch, a ring, and a wallet, which Thompson handed to Freeman. At this point, according to Thompson, the victim reached for Thompson's weapon, and the gun discharged. Thompson admitted emptying his weapon at Liuzza before fleeing the scene. He also told Perkins that Freeman had fled the scene with Liuzza's wallet before he shot him. When Perkins asked about the gun he sold to J.R. for him, Thompson admitted it was the gun he used in the killing. He then said "you see J.R., he don't know. He got everything and he don't know what he got". Thompson told Perkins that he acquired a watch, a ring, and a wallet full of credit cards, but no money from Liuzza.</p>

<p>A short time after these conversations took place, Perkins went to a friend, whom he identified as Gregory Dawson, and told him what Thompson and Freeman had said. As he talked, Mr. Dawson wrote all of the information down on a large piece of paper. It should be noted that when this subject arose, Mr. Dawson handed Det. Curole a large white cardboard folder with the words "Metropolitan Life Insurance Company" printed on front. Inside the folder are handwritten notes outlining the information provided to Mr. Dawson by Perkins. The information contained in these notes corresponds with the information Perkins supplied to Det. Curole during his statement. After reviewing this information, Det. Curole requested that Perkins sign and date the cardboard page on which the notes are written. These notes were retained as evidence and are now located in the case file.</p> <p>Before concluding this statement, Perkins told Det. Curole that the information he possessed weighed heavily upon him, resulting in loss of appetite and insomnia. His belief that Thompson and Freeman should be imprisoned for what they did prompted his decision to tell Liuzza's father what he knew.</p> <p>Richard Perkins statement was concluded at 3:53 PM on Wednesday, January 16, 1985. An original copy of Perkins signed statement is now contained in the case file.</p> <p>After concluding this statement, Perkins informed Det. Curole that he knew where J.R. resided, but did not know his real name, or the address. Before leaving the hotel, Perkins promised to obtain J.R.'s address and relay it to Det. Curole before the end of the day.</p> <p>At 6:30 PM, Richard Perkins telephoned Det. Curole in the Homicide Office and identified J.R.'s residence as 2500 Erato St., Apt. A. According to Perkins, the apartment could be identified by a large spotlight which was positioned in the window and shone down on two large motorcycles parked in the grass beneath the window.</p> <p>From the statements of Richard Perkins and Kenneth Carr, Det. Curole and Demma obtained sufficient probable cause to suspect John Thompson and Kevin Freeman of the murder of Ray T. Liuzza. These suspicions led the investigators to prepare arrest warrant applications for Thompson and Freeman, and search warrant applications for the dwellings located at 1302 Simon Bolivar (Thompson's residence) 2220 Felicity (Freeman's residence), and 2500 Erato, Apt. A (the reported residence of J.R.).</p> <p>At 12:05 AM, Thursday, January 17, 1985, Dets. Donald Curole and Marco Demma proceeded to the Criminal Courts Building, 2700 Tulane Ave., where they met with Magistrate Commissioner Nils Douglas in his chambers. After reviewing the previously prepared applications, Judge Douglas issued arrest warrants for John Thompson and Kevin Freeman, charging them</p>

<p>with the murder of Ray Liuzza, and search warrants for the premises mentioned above. Original copies of these applications, and warrants, are now contained in the case file.</p> <p>At 1AM, Dets. Curole and Demma, accompanied by Lt. Byron Anderson and Sgt. David Morales executed the search warrant for 2500 Erato St., Apt. A. Upon knocking on the front door, the investigators were met by a negro female identified as Aslee Cosey, date of birth 2-5-34, who invited them into her apartment. Once inside Det. Curole appraised Miss Cosey of situation. Miss Cosey replied that she resided with her only son, identified as Lloyd Cosey, NM, 9-5-53 who was not at home. and knew no one named J.R. A subsequent search of Miss Cosey's apartment failed to uncover any evidence. A copy of the warrant authorizing the search was left with Miss Cosey before the Dets. departure.</p> <p>When the investigators first approached this residence, Det. Curole realized that the spotlight, and motorcycles Richard Perkins had mentioned were missing. When the search failed, Det. Curole suspected that Perkins had provided him with the wrong address. Upon concluding this search, Dets. Curole and Demma proceeded to 2116 St. Andrew St. where they met with Richard Perkins and voiced their suspicions. Perkins then offered to take the Dets. into the Project and point out J.R.'s apartment.</p> <p>At 1:30 AM, Richard Perkins directed Dets. Curole and Demma to an apartment at 2500 Thalia St., Apt. A, which he identified as J.R.'s residence. After returning Perkins to his home, Dets. Curole and Demma returned to their office where they prepared an additional search warrant containing the correct address of 2500 Thalia, Apt. A.</p> <p>At 2:15 AM, Dets. Curole and Demma proceeded to 6625 Congress Dr., where they presented Judge Douglas with the revised search warrant application, which he reviewed and signed. An original copy of this document is also contained in the case file.</p> <p>At 2:40 AM, Dets. Donald Curole, Marco Demma, Lt. Byron Anderson and Sgt. David Morales executed the search warrant for 2500 Thalia Apt. A. As they approached the apartment, Det. Curole immediately noticed a large spotlight in the window, which illuminated two large motorcycles parked alongside the building. Upon knocking at the door, the investigators were met by a negro male who identified himself as Junior Lee Harris, date of birth 1-15-48, also known as "Jr", or "J.R". After presenting Harris with a copy of the search warrant, the officers entered the apartment and began questioning him. During this questioning, Det. Curole noticed that Harris was wearing a small gold ring on the little finger of his left hand. A closer inspection of this ring, which fit the description of the one stolen from Liuzza, revealed the initial "L" engraved in the crown. During questioning Mr. Harris informed Det. Curole that he purchased the ring from "Nut". (Nut is a known moniker utilized</p>

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<p>by the suspect John Thompson"). During a subsequent search of the apartment the investigators located two weapons, a Dan Wesson .357 caliber blue steel revolver with a 6" barrel, serial # 210485, and a Colt 6" blue steel revolver, Serial # K5464, beneath a sofa located in the livingroom. The two revolvers, and the initial ring worn by Mr. Harris were confiscated by Det. Curole as possible evidence. A search of the remainder of the apartment uncovered no additional evidence.</p> <p>Following the search, Dets. Curole and Demma asked Mr. Harris if he had purchased a Taurus .357 blue steel revolver from anyone recently. Mr. Harris replied that he had purchased such a weapon from a friend of Nut, but had since sold the weapon to an acquaintance named "Brother". Harris said that Brother lived just across the courtyard and offered to take the investigators there.</p> <p>At 3AM Harris directed Dets. Curole and Demma to 2519 Martin Luther King Apt. 2C. Harris knocked on the door and was met by a young negro male whom he addressed as Brother. Mr. Harris told brother that the police were looking for the gun he had sold him and asked if he could have it back. Det. Curole then assured Brother that he was in no trouble and asked if eh still had the pistol. Borthor, later identified as Jessie Harrison, NM, 12-5-60, then invited the Dets. into his apartment and led Det. Curole into his livingroom. Harrison retrieved two pistols from behind a large china cabinet located in the livingroom, and asked Det. Curole which one he was interested in. Harrison indicated that he had purchased both weapons from Junior Harris recently. One of these weapons was a Taurus 4" .357 manguon blue steel revolver, bearing serial # 11387. The second weapon was a Colt Super .38 cal automatic pistol bearing serial # 90812. After producing the weapons, Mr. Harrison granted Det. Curole permission to confiscate them as possible evidence in a homicide investigation. Det. Curole supplied Mr. Harrison with a handwritten receipt for the weapons before removing them from his residence. Mr. Harrison later rendered a formal statement concerning his acquisition of the murder weapon. The inforamtion collected from this interview will be outlined later in this report.</p> <p>Following this Junion Harris, and the articles collected were transported to the Homicide Office. The Taurus revolver, believed to be the murder weapon, was delivered to the Property and Evidence Division and turned over to Officer Blanks. Receipt #A76288, which was issued by Officer Blanks for this evidence, is now contained in the case file.</p> <p>At 3:45 AM, Dets. Marco Demma, Michael Rice, Ray Miller, Donald Saucier and Sgt. James Eaton executed the search warrant for the residence at 2220 Felicity St. Upon knocking, Det. Demma was met at the door by a young negro male who identified himself as Kevin Freeman. At this point, Det. Demma informed Mr. Freeman that he was under arrest for murder, and verbally advised him of his constitutional rights.</p>

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		<p>The detectives then conducted a search of the residence which failed to uncover any evidence. Following this search, Freeman was transported to the Homicide Office by Dets. Ray Miller and Donald Saucier and incarcerated in a holding cell pending the arrival of the investigating Dets. Freeman's vehicle, a 1975 chevrolet Monte Carlo, burgundy, bearing Louisiana license 53B957, which was parked in front of the residence, was impounded by Det. Demma in connection with this investigation. This vehicle is now located in the Almonaster Auto Pound and is being held as possible evidence.</p> <p>Also at 3:45 AM, Dets. Donald Curole, Sgt. David Morales and Lt. Byron Anderson exeucted the search warrant on Thompson's residence at 1302 Simon Bolivar. These investigators were invited into the residence by an elderly negor female identified as Dorothy Jackson. Miss Jackson, who is John Thompson's grandmother, informed the Dets. that Thompson resides in her home, but was not there at the time. Miss Jackson stated that Thompson left the house at about 9:30 PM, and probably would not return until later that day. A subsequent search of the residence failed to locate Thompson, or any evidence connected with the murder of Ray Liuzza. Before leaving, Det. Curole informed Miss Jackson of the situation and requested she contact him as soon as Thompson appears. Following this the investigators departed the scene and returned to the Homicide Office.</p> <p>At 4:50 AM, Det. Curole reunited himself with Mr. Junior Harris in the Homicide Office and formally advised him of his constitutional riths from Rights of Arrestee form # 215376. Mr. Harris was further informed that he was under investigation for the murder of Ray Liuzza, and the possession of stolen property. Mr. Harris then signed the form, voluntarily waiving his rights, and agreed to cooperate fully in the investigation. An original copy of this Rights of Arrestee form is now contained in the case file.</p> <p>At 5AM, Thursday, January 17, 1985, Det. Donald Curole began taking a typewritten statement from Mr. Junior Harris, NM, 1-15-48. Harris said in his statement that a week or two before Christmas, he was not sure exactly when, a friend of Nut, John Thompson's monkier, came to his apartment with a pistol. This friend, who addresses Harris as J.R., sold the pistol to him for \$50.00 dollars and a bag of marijuana. Harris did not know the man's name, nor could he remember exactly when this transaction ocured, except to say it took place at night. Harris later sold this weapon to another friend of his, named Brother. At this point Det. Curole handed Mr. Harris a photo of Richard Perkins and asked if he recognized this man. After viewing the photo Harris replied "YEA, that's the little dude that sold me the gun". Harris then signed and dated the rear of the photo he had just identified.</p> <p>Det. Curole questioned Mr. Harris concering the gold ring he wore at the time the investigators served the search warrant on his apartment.</p>

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<p>Mr. Harris told Det. Curole that he purchased the ring from NUT in December, about a week after he purchased the pistol from Richard Perkins. The transaction occurred at his apartment at night, but again he could not remember the day or date. Mr. Harris paid Nut (John Thompson) \$10.00 dollars for the ring, which Thompson indicated he intended to use to purchase a "clicker". Det. Curole asked Harris if he knew Nut's real name, and he replied he did not.</p> <p>At 5:33 AM, during the course of this statment, Det. Curole allowed Mr. Harris to view a previously prepared photographic lineup containing the photo of John Thompson. After carefully viewing each photograph, Mr. Harris positively identified the photo of John Thompson as the man that sold him the gold ring. Mr. Harris then signed and dated the rear of the photog he identified, and initialed and dated the remaining photographs.</p> <p>The photographs utilized in these identifications have been marked as evidence, and are now contained in the case file. An original copy of Mr. Harris signed statement is also contained in the case file.</p> <p>At 5AM, Thursday, January 17, 1985, Det. Marco Demma relocated Kevin Freeman from the holding cell to a private office where he formally advised Freeman of his constitutional rights from Rights of Arrestee form # 215377. Mr. Freeman informed Det. Demma that he fully understood his rights, and intended to waive those rights and speak with Det. Demma. Mr. Freeman then signed the form, indicating he understood his rights and wished to waive them.</p> <p>In a subsequent verbal interview, Freeman initially denied any involvement in the robbery/murder of Ray Liuzza. However when Det. Demma confronted him with the fact that someone had relayed details of his involvement in the incident, Freeman withdrew his denial and admitted he participated in the robbery with another man, whom he accused of killing Liuzza. Det. Demma then asked Mr. Freeman if he would be willing to render a formal confession of his involvement in this crime. Mr. Freeman replied that he would, but first wished to consult with a member of his family.</p> <p>At 5:20 AM, Kevin Freeman telephoned his sister, whom he identified as Debra Freeman, from the Homicide Division Office. During this conversation, Freeman informed his sister that he was involved in the robbery of Liuzza, but that John Thomas (Thompson) actually killed him. He then related some of the details of the crime to his sister. Before concluding this conversation, Freeman advised his sister that he had been arrested for this crime, and was now at police headquarters. He further informed her that he intended to tell the police everything he knew about the illing. After concluding this conversation, Mr. Freeman advised Det. 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<p>At 5:38 AM, Det. marco Demma began taking a typewritten statement from Kevin Freeman. Freeman said in his statement that he was driving home from the St. Thomas Project when he observed Nut (John Thompson) walking along Prytania. Freeman stopped and talked to Thompson, who asked him for a ride home. After Thompson entered the car, Freeman continued his journey home. Shortly thereafter Freeman's vehicle, a 1974 burgundy Chevrolet Monte Carlo, ran out of gas, forcing him to park it in the middle of a block of Carondelet St. As the two continued home on foot, Thompson asked Freeman if he "wanted to make some money". Thompson then added "I got the heat with me", meaning he was armed with a pistol. As this conversation continued Freeman observed the victim park his small grey car on Josephine St., between Baronne and Brainard Sts. As the victim, a white man dressed in a suit, got out of his car and began crossing Josephine St., Thompson remarked "m going to hit him". With this Thompson, who was dressed in a heavy black jacket and blue jeans, pulled a large black pistol with brown handles from his pants and approached the victim. It should be noted that this description matches that of the man Paul Schliffka observed running from the scene following the shooting. Mr. Schliffka had described this fleeing spspect as a black man wearing a black jacket, dark pants, possibly blue jeans, and holding a large black pistol in his right hand.</p> <p>When Thompson met the victim, Liuzza had just corssed the street from his vehicle and was standing on the sidewalk near a door on the side of the house. It should also be noted that this information coincides with information received from Pam Staab, who stated she heard Liuzza begging for his life just prior to the shooting. From the sound of Liuzza's voice, Miss Staab estimated that the robbery ocured on the sidewalk, near the front door of her apartment. This is the door Mr. Freeman is refering to in his statement.</p> <p>As Thompson approached the victim, Freeman began backing away. As he watched, Thompson grabbed the victim, who was now near the driveway located the back of the house, around the neck and forced him to the ground. As Thompson pointed his gun at Liuzza, Freeman turned and ran down Jospeline St. toward Dryades. As he was running on Josephine St, halfway between Baronne and Dryades, Freeman said that he looked back briefly, but then continued running home. According to Freeman, this incident ocured about 1AM in the morning.</p> <p>The next day Freeman again met with John Thompson who began speaking of the robbery. Thompson told Freeman that he stold the man's wallet, which contained credit cards but no money, a ring, and a watch. When Freeman asked why he shot the man, Thompson replied he had to shoot him because he was trying to take his gun away from him.</p> <p>Det. Freeman continued that Funk (Richard Perkins) approached him one day and told him he knew that Thompson shot that man on Josephine St. Freeman could not recall when this conversation took place, and maintained that he did not tell Funk anything about the incident.</p> <p>During the course of this statement, Mr. Freeman repeatedly referred to Thompson as "Nut". When Det. Demma asked Freeman if he knew Nut's real name he replied: "John Thomas", instead of Thompson. At 7:45 AM, Det. When Freeman reached the photo of Thompson, he pulled it from the stack and positively identified it as "Nut". Donald Curole and Marco Demma escorted Kevin Freeman to Central Lockup where he was booked in violation of RS 14 Art 30 relative to the murder Ray Liuzza, and RS 14 Art 64 relative to the Armed Robbery of Ray Liuzza.</p> <p>At 9AM, Thursday, January 17, 1985, Det. Curole met with the witness, Paul Schliffka, at his apartment at 2026 Baronne St. During this meeting Det. Curole allowed Mr. Schliffka to view the two previously prepared photographic lineups containing the photos of John Thompson and Kevin Freeman. Mr. Schliffka carefully viewed the photographs in each lineup, but was unable to recognize any of the photos as that of the man he observed fleeing the scene of the shooting.</p> <p>At 9:30 AM, Dets. Curole and Demma were contacted by Det. Otho Stubbs, Firearms Examiner for the New Orleans Police Department. Det. Stubbs informed Det. Curole that he had just completed a comparison examination of a test pellet, fired from the recovered Taurus Revolver, Serial # 11387, with the two spent pellets recovered from the scene of Liuzza's murder. These examinations proved conclusively that the pellets recovered from the scene were fired by the Taurus revolver recovered from Jessie Harrison earlier that morning, identifying it as the murder weapon. Det. Stubbs later prepared a report outlining the results of his examinations. A copy of this document is now contained in the case file.</p> <p>At 9:45 AM, Thursday, January 17, 1985, Dets. Curole and Demma met with Miss Jody Beauregard and Mr. Bill Brown in the Offices of the Homicide Division. During this meeting, Det. Curole presented the gold initial ring, confiscated earlier from Junior Harris, to Miss Beauregard and asked if she recognized it. Miss Beauregard immediately identified the ring as the one owned by her longtime boyfriend, Ray Liuzza. Miss Beauregard then signed and dated the envelope containing the ring she had</p>

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<p>just identified. This ring was later delivered to the Property and Evidence Division where it was turned over to Correctional Officer N. Joseph. Receipt # A76335, which was issued for this evidence, is now contained in the case file.</p> <p>At 10:15 AM, Det. Curole received a message from Homicide Secretary Miss Virginia Johnson indicating that Miss Dorothy Jackson, Thompson's grandmother, had called in reference to Thompson. Det. Curole immediately attempted to contact Miss Jackson, but her line was already in use.</p> <p>At 10:50 AM, Det. Curole successfully contacted Miss Jackson via telephone, at which time she informed him that John Thompson had returned home, and wished to surrender himself to the investigating officers. Miss Jackson assured Det. Curole that Thompson would remain at the residence until the officers arrived. Following this conversation, Det. Curole contacted Dets. William Roth and Michael Scortino, Car 3128 of the General Assignment Unit and appraised them of Thompson's location. Dets. Roth and Scortino, who were in the area of Thompson's residence, proceeded directly to 1320 Simon Bolivar where, at 11AM, they effected the arrest of John Thompson. Dets. Scortino and Roth then transported John Thompson to the Homicide Division where they relinquished custody to Dets. Curole and Demma.</p> <p>At 11:15 AM, Det. Curole verbally advised John Thompson of his constitutional rights, and of the fact that he was under arrest for the armed robbery/murder of Ray Liuzza. Mr. Thompson indicated that he understood his rights and wished to exercise his right to remain silent. No further interviews were conducted with John Thompson from that point on.</p> <p>At 11:45 AM, Dets. Curole met with Mr. Jessie Lee Harrison, NM, 12-5-60, residing 2519 Martin Luther King Apt. 2 in the offices of the Homicide Division. In a subsequent typewritten statement, Mr. Harrison said that he purchased the Taurus .357 magnum revolver, which was subsequently confiscated from his residence, from Junior Harris at Harris' apartment on Decmeber 17, 1985. Harrison stated that he paid \$80.00 dollars for the weapon and was told at the time of purchase that the weapon was not stolen, or involved in any crime. Harrison admitted in his statement that he freely and voluntarily turned the weapon over to the investigators when they came to his apartment during the early morning hours of January 17, 1985. An original copy of Mr. Harrison's signed statement is now contained in the case file, and is available for future reference.</p>
