

I am John Rees and am seeking an opportunity to serve as a bar commissioner. I would appreciate your vote and support.

The bar has provided many opportunities for me to serve, including as co-chair of the innovation in law practice committee (which received the committee of the year award in 2018), founder and initial chair of the cyberlaw section, co-chair of one of the bar's annual meetings in Sun Valley, and chair of the business law section.
