This bill modifies provisions relating to the Utah Supreme Court.

 modifies provisions governing the membership and internal management of the Utah

 provides that the governor shall appoint a chief justice of the Utah Supreme Court (chief
justice) when a vacancy in the office occurs;
 requires that a governor's selection for chief justice is subject to the advice and consent of
the Senate;
 modifies the term of office for chief justice;
 modifies provisions related to an interim chief justice and appointment procedures; and
 makes technical and conforming changes.

Other Special Clauses:
This bill provides a special effective date.
This bill provides revisor instructions.
Utah Code Sections Affected:
AMENDS:
78A-3-101, as last amended by Laws of Utah 2022, Chapter 276

- Be it enacted by the Legislature of the state of Utah:
- Section 1. Section 78A-3-101 is amended to read:

28	78A-3-101. Number of justices Terms Chief justice and associate chief
29	justice Selection and functions.
30	(1) The Supreme Court consists of five justices.
31	(2)(a) A justice of the Supreme Court [shall be] is appointed initially to serve until the
32	first general election held more than three years after the effective date of the
33	appointment.
34	(b) After the first term of appointment under Subsection (2)(a), the term of office of a
35	justice of the Supreme Court is 10 years and commences on the first Monday in
36	January following the date of election.
37	(c) A justice whose term expires may serve upon request of the Judicial Council until a
38	successor is appointed and qualified.]
39	(3)[(a) The justices of the Supreme Court shall elect a chief justice from among the
40	members of the court by a majority vote of all justices.]
41	[(b) The term of the office of chief justice is four years.]
42	[(e) The chief justice may serve successive terms.]
43	[(d)] (a) Upon any vacancy in the office of chief justice, including expiration of a term of
44	the office of chief justice, or upon a chief justice's death, removal, or resignation, the

88	Section 2. Effective Date.

The Legislature intends that the Office of Legislative Research and General Counsel, in

Independent Auditors' Report

To the Board of Commissioners of the Utah State Bar

Opinion

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Utah State Bar (a nonprofit organization) (the Bar), which comprise the statement of financial position as of June 30, 2025, the related statements of activities and cash flows for the year then ended, and the related notes to financial statements.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Utah State Bar as of June 30, 2025, and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the *Auditors' Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements* section of our report. We are required to be independent of Utah State Bar and to meet our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audit. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Bar's ability to continue as a going concern within one year after the date that the financial statements are available to be issued.

Auditors' Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditors' report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

In performing an audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, we:

- Exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.
- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, and design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks. Such procedures include examining, on a test basis, evidence regarding the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures
 that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the
 effectiveness of the Bar's internal control. Accordingly, no such opinion is expressed.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluate the overall presentation of the financial statements.
- Conclude whether, in our judgment, there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Bar's ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of time.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control related matters that we identified during the audit.

Report on Summarized Comparative Information

We have previously audited the Utah State Bar's 2024 financial statements and we expressed an unmodified opinion on those financial statements in our report dated October 16, 2024. In our opinion, the summarized comparative information presented herein as of June 30, 2024 and for the year then ended is consistent, in all material respects, with the audited financial statements from which it was derived.

Report on Supplemental Schedules

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the financial statements as a whole. The supplemental schedules of continuing legal education and conferences revenues and expenses, member services revenues and expenses, public services revenues and expenses, bar sections revenues and expenses, mandatory continuing education advisory board, and facilities revenues and expenses are presented for the purpose of additional analysis and are not a required part of the financial statements. These schedules are the responsibility of the Bar's management and are derived from and relate directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. Such schedules have been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in our audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such schedules directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, such schedules are fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements as a whole.

Notes to Financial Statements

1. Description of Organization and Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Description of Organization

The Utah State Bar (the Bar or the Organization) is an organization created by statute in 1931 under the laws of the state of Utah. The Bar's purpose was amended and clarified by the Utah State Constitution and by court order on June 30, 1981, and the Bar was incorporated as a 501(c)(6) organization on June 24, 1991. All attorneys licensed under the laws of the state of Utah, which approximate 14,500 are considered licensees of the Bar.

Basis of Presentation and Fund Accounting

The assets, liabilities and net assets of the Bar have been prepared in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (US GAAP), which require the Bar to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to the following net asset classifications, as applicable:

Net assets without donor restrictions: Net assets that are not subject to donor-imposed restrictions and may be expended for any purpose in performing the primary objectives of the Bar. These net assets may be used at the discretion of the Bar's management and Board of Directors.

Net assets with donor restrictions: Net assets subject to restrictions imposed by donors and grantors. Some donor restrictions are temporary in nature; those restrictions will be met by actions of the Bar or by the passage of time. Other donor restrictions are perpetual in nature, where the donor stipulates the funds be maintained in perpetuity.

Net assets without donor restrictions are presented as designated or undesignated. The undesignated fund is used for the general operations of the Bar. The designated funds are used for activities of the various Bar sections, the Fund for Client Protection, and the Mandatory Continuing Legal Education Fund (MCLE Fund), including overhead charges to defray the costs of administering those funds.

The financial statements include prior-year summarized comparative information in total but not by net asset class. Such information does not include sufficient detail to constitute a presentation in accordance with US GAAP. Accordingly, such information should be read in conjunction with the Bar's financial statements as of and for the year ended June 30, 2024, from which the summarized information was derived.

Concentrations of Risk

The Bar maintains its cash and cash equivalents in bank deposit accounts which, at times, exceed federally insured limits. As of June 30, 2025 and 2024, the Organization had cash and cash equivalents balances in excess of federally insured limits. To date, the Organization has not experienced a loss or lack of access to its invested cash; however, no assurance can be provided that access to the Organization's invested cash and cash equivalents will not be impacted by adverse conditions in financial markets.

Use of Estimates in Preparing Financial Statements

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with US GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

Cash Equivalents

The Bar considers all highly liquid investments purchased with original maturities to the Bar of three months or less to be cash equivalents. As of June 30, 2025, these cash equivalents consisted of money market mutual funds totaling \$4,548,071.

Investments

Investments consist primarily of corporate bonds. Investments are reported at their fair values in the statement of financial position. Realized and unrealized gains or losses are reflected currently in the statements of activities.

Property and Equipment

Property and equipment are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and amortization. Depreciation and amortization are calculated using the straight-line method over the estimated economic useful lives of the assets or over the related lease terms (if shorter), as follows:

Building	25 years
Building improvements	10-25 years
Computers and computer software	3-5 years
Office furniture, equipment and leased equipment	3-7 years

Expenditures for routine maintenance and repairs are charged to operating expenses as incurred. Major renewals and betterments are capitalized and depreciated over their estimated useful lives. Upon retirement or other disposition of property and equipment, the cost and accumulated depreciation and amortization are removed from the accounts and any gain or loss is recorded as income or expense in the statements of activities.

Revenue Recognition and Deferred Revenue

The Bar recognizes revenue from licensing, admissions, continuing legal education, services and programs, conventions, bar examinations, room rental and catering and other services when the Organization has (1) identified the customer contract, (2) identified the performance obligation in the contract, (3) determined the transaction price, (4) allocated the entire transaction price to the single performance obligation, and (5) recognized revenue when the performance obligation has been satisfied. Licensing fees are assessed in June for the following fiscal year. All fees collected prior to the current fiscal year-end are recorded as deferred revenue. Deferred revenue is recognized as income in the year in which it is earned (i.e., benefits provided to licensees).

Grant Revenue

Grants received are recorded as with or without donor restrictions, depending on the existence and/or nature of any donor restrictions. Revenue from grants with a measurable performance or other barrier, and a right of return, are not recognized until the conditions on which they depend have been substantially met.

If a donor restriction expires in the same reporting period in which the grant revenue was initially recognized that revenue is reported as an increase in net assets without donor restriction. All other donor-restricted revenue is reported as an increase in net assets with donor restrictions. When a restriction expires (that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished), net assets with donor restrictions are reclassified to net assets without donor restrictions and reported in the statements of activities as net assets released from restrictions.

Income Taxes

On June 24, 1991, the Bar was incorporated as a 501(c)(6) organization andhas received a determination letter from the Internal Revenue Service exempting the Bar from federal income taxes. Management believes that the Bar is designed and operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the Internal Revenue Code and, accordingly, no provision for federal and state income taxes has been provided for in the accompanying statements of activities.

The Bar is subject to income tax at current corporate rates on net income from unrelated business activities. Income taxes on unrelated business activities have not been significant. The Bar paid no income taxes during the year ended June 30, 2025.

A liability for uncertain tax positions is recognized in the financial statements when it is more likely than not the position will not be sustained uponexamination by the tax authorities. As of June 30, 2025, the Bar had no uncertain tax positions that qualified for either recognition or disclosure in thefinancial statements. The Bar is subject to routine audits by tax jurisdictions; however, there are no audits for any tax periods in progress.

Subsequent Events

Management has evaluated events occurring subsequent to June 30, 2025 through October 9, 2025, which is the date the financial statements were available.

Reclassifications

Certain amounts in the 2024 financial statements have been reclassified to conform with the current year presentation.

2. Liquidity and Availability

Financial assets available for general expenditure, that is, without donor or other restrictions limiting their use, within one year of the date of the statement of financial position, comprise the following as of June 30:

The Bar regularly monitors liquidity required to meet its operating needs and other contractual commitments using budgets and cash flow projections, while also striving to maximize the investment of its available funds. The Bar's excess cash is invested in a portfolio of corporate bonds. Additionally, the Bar's governing board has designated a portion of its unrestricted resources for contingencies, which is identified as board-designated in the table above (Note 7).

4. Fair Value Measurements

The Bar's financial instruments consist of investments as of June 30, 2025 and 2024. Management believes that the recorded value of each financial instrument approximates its fair value.

Fair value is defined as the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. To increase the comparability of fair value measures, the following hierarchy prioritizes the inputs to valuation methodologies used to measure fair value:

Level 1 Valuations based on quoted prices for identical assets orliabilities in active markets.

Level 2 Valuations based on observable inputs other than quoted prices included in Level 1, such as quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets, quoted prices for identical or similar assets and liabilities in markets that are not active, or other inputsthat are observable or can be corroborated by observable market data.

Level 3 Valuations based on unobservable inputs reflecting the Bar's own assumptions, applied consistently with reasonably available assumptions made by other market participants. These valuations require significant judgment.

6. Employee Benefit Plans

The Bar sponsors a defined contribution 401(k) plan (the Plan). Upon hiring, employees who have attained the age of 21 or older may elect to contribute a portion of their compensation, subject to Internal Revenue Code limitations, to the Plan. Following employees' one year anniversary, the Bar contributes to the Plan an amount equal to 10% of their compensation. Contributions to the Plan were \$326,192 and \$304,716 for the years ended June 30, 2025 and 2024, respectively.

The Bar sponsors a Section 125 cafeteria plan. All contributions to this plan are made by the participants.

7. Board Designated Net Assets Without Donor Restrictions

Board designated net assets without donor restrictions consist of the Bar operation's reserves for potential future liabilities and assets designated for Bar sections, Fund for Client Protection, and the mandatory continuing legal education fund. 8. Fund for Client Protection

On October 30, 1983, the Bar received approval from the Utah Supreme Court to assess lawyers and Licensed Paralegal Practitioners (LPPs) to maintain the Fund at sufficient levels to pay eligible claims. The Bar is required to maintain a Fund balance of at least \$200,000. Before annual licensing begins, the Bar calculates how much each lawyer and LPP must pay to maintain the Fund balance. After the Supreme Court approves the assessment amount, the Bar adds the assessment amount to the annual licensing renewal form so lawyers can pay the amount during the renewal process. The assessment averages \$5 to \$7 but has been as high as \$20 depending on claims made to the Fund. There were no fees collected for the year ended June 30, 2025. A fee of \$7 was collected from licensee attorneys for the year ended June 30, 2024.

Cases must be reviewed and approved by the Fund Committee of the Bar and also by the Board of Commissioners of the Bar before they are considered to be claims payable by the Fund. The Fund Committee routinely reviews open matters. In the Fund Committee's opinion, these open matters will not have a material adverse effect on the financial position, results of activities, or liquidity of the Bar.

9. Expenses By Nature and Function

The accompanying financial statements include certain expenses that are attributable to both program and supporting functions of the Bar. These expenses include salaries and wages, employee benefits, and supplies and other office expenses, which are allocated based on head count; and depreciation, utilities, and maintenance, which are allocated based on estimated square footage.

Nominee: Chelsey Phelps, LMFT; Current role: Secretary, AFCC Utah Chapter

Chelsey has served the Utah legal community with exceptional dedication in her role as Secretary of the AFCC Utah Chapter. Her leadership has expanded the bridge between family law professionals and the mental health community. The result is a better-informed public, more effective courts, and improved outcomes for families navigating high conflict matters.

Chelsey has advanced public understanding of the legal profession and justice system by:

- Education that reaches both the bar and the public. Chelsey designs and teaches
 continuing legal education programs that translate complex psychological concepts
 into practical tools for lawyers, judges, and mediators. Topics include child
 development in high conflict cases, reunification frameworks, and trauma-informed
 practices. These programs equip legal professionals to explain processes and
 options to clients in clearer, calmer language.
- Leadership that scales impact. As Secretary, Chelsey modernized event planning, communications, and volunteer coordination for AFCC Utah. Her efforts increased attendance, broadened interdisciplinary participation, and ensured consistent delivery of high quality programming that members can bring back to their clients and communities.
- 3. Conference planning with real results. Chelsey has been instrumental in organizing AFCC Utah conferences that bring attorneys, judicial officers, guardians ad litem, and therapists into the same room. These gatherings have improved shared vocabulary and reduced misunderstandings that often slow cases and frustrate families.
- 4. Service that centers families. Chelsey volunteers significant time to mentorship and resource sharing. She connects attorneys with mental health professionals for case consultations and helps therapists understand the court's expectations. This collaboration improves the public's experience of the legal system and increases confidence in court-ordered processes.

Impact highlights

- Multiple CLE presentations and panels addressing parenting plans, child resistance or refusal, and mediation skills.
- Documented improvements in attendee feedback on clarity, usefulness, and immediate application to client communication and case strategy.

 Driven strong interdisciplinary attendance at AFCC Utah programs, which improves the consistency of advice families receive.

Chelsey's work makes the legal system more understandable and humane for families. She models professionalism, humility, and collaboration. Her steady leadership within AFCC Utah has multiplied the Chapter's ability to educate the public through better trained lawyers and more aligned professional partners.

Nominee: Association of Family and Conciliation Courts, Utah Chapter

The AFCC Utah Chapter has transformed the way our state's legal community understands and serves families. The Chapter's programming helps attorneys, judges, commissioners, and mental health professionals speak the same language about child development, conflict resolution, and safe parenting arrangements. The result is a better informed public and a justice system that works more effectively for families in crisis. The Utah Chapter is the fastest growing chapter in the world and has been for 3 years running.

How AFCC Utah advances public understanding and the administration of justice

- Education that spreads quickly and widely. Through conferences, workshops, and CLEs, AFCC Utah provides practical, research-based education to legal professionals. When lawyers and judges gain a clearer understanding of mental health issues, they can explain options to clients in plain terms and craft orders that families can follow.
- Interdisciplinary collaboration. AFCC Utah is the hub where the bench, the bar, and mental health experts meet. This collaboration reduces confusion for families, shortens learning curves for professionals, and promotes consistent practices across courtrooms.
- 3. Mediation Day. For the past three years, AFCC Utah has organized Mediation Day in both Salt Lake County and Utah County. Mediation Day is designed for unrepresented parties to have the opportunity come to the courthouse, be represented by a volunteer attorney, have a volunteer mediator mediate their case, mental health professionals on hand to provide input or assistance, and paralegals to help draft documents. Several Judges and Commissioners are on hand to sign the Decrees if cases are resolved. The AFCC Chapter recruits an army of volunteers to put this on multiple times per year, and each mediation day has had between 15 and 25 cases, with most cases reaching a full resolution.

- Annual and midyear conferences that attract attorneys, judges, commissioners, guardians ad litem, mediators, and therapists.
- Consistent programming on child-centered practices, trauma awareness, and effective mediation.
- Mediation Day events that demonstrate how collaborative resolution reduces court backlog, costs, and conflict for families.
- Positive public coverage that highlights real outcomes for community members seeking resolution.

AFCC Utah has made the justice system easier to navigate for families by equipping legal professionals with clear, shared frameworks and by delivering needed services through Mediation Day. The Chapter's work exemplifies service to the community and aligns directly with the award's purpose.

As discussed today, I'd like to nominate Chelsy Phelps and the AFCC Utah Chapter for the Distinguished Community Member Award.

Chelsy is a Marriage and Family Therapist who has been active both within and without the legal community. Within the legal community, she has provided training to Family Law attorneys through Utah on non-legal options for resolving high-conflict family matters through therapeutic treatments, enabling attorneys to approach family matters holistically, providing better results for children of divorce than are generally achieved through pure litigation. She also helps attorneys develop a trauma-informed approach to high conflict litigation. She, along with AFCC, hosts educational events where attorneys obtain CLEs while learning best practices in family law matters, and therapists learn about family law and their roles in high-conflict family legal matters.

I personally learned much from Chelsey at an AFCC-sponsored CLE event. I was also referred to Chelsy as a resource when taking the Guardian Ad Litem training. These experiences and my discussions with senior family law attorneys made clear to me that Chelsy has been a long standing resource in the community, promoting and educating on holistic conflict resolution in family matters, and that her efforts have greatly improved outcomes for children in high-conflict family law cases.

Regarding AFCC itself, I have long admired their efforts to educate attorneys, therapists, judges, and other professionals that are involved in family law matters, either directly or indirectly. Every Guardian Ad Litem in Utah, both public and private, are introduced to the resources AFCC provides to both members and non-members. I have personally benefitted from AFCC resources, even though I am not a member. Their resources have improved my practice immensely.

HEARTS AND HANDS AWARD: Brandon Owen combined his legal expertise with his passion for tennis (former U of U college player) and pickleball (senior pro tour player) to support underprivileged youth, particularly among the Navajo Nation. Shortly after law school, Brandon began volunteering with Tennis n Tutoring, a Judge Valdez project at Liberty Park. This initiative introduced juvenile delinquent boys at Decker Lake to tennis, offering them a positive outlet through sports and competition. Inspired by this work, Brandon started his own organization that expanded his efforts to the Navajo Nation, where he has taught tennis and pickleball to Navajo elementary school students for years. Recognizing that Navajo children often can travel hours by bus to Bluff elementary, he and his family regularly traveled to the reservation, painting tennis lines on school playgrounds and raising funds, donating rackets, snacks, and equipment. At Bluff Elementary—where 99% of students are Navajo—his efforts have given children access to a sport that promotes physical health, discipline, and broader life aspirations.

The Navajo Nation faces a diabetes epidemic, as shared to him by tribal leaders, making health-focused activities critical for youth. Brandon's work provided a means for children to combat diabetes, stay active, and experience opportunities beyond their community. By participating in high school tennis programs, these students can travel with high school tennis beyond their rural surroundings, gaining exposure and inspiration for their futures.

Beyond sports, Brandon has contributed to Bluff's after-school enrichment by creating a science experiment video series for Navajo youth. Many children endure long bus rides to and from school, often lacking proper food and engagement. The principal has suggested many youth only have hot meals at the school. Brandon has helped supply both, ensuring these students have constructive, stimulating activities to break up their travel time.

His service extends further—he has worked with Design Build Bluff (architect. program w/ U of U), bringing his youth to help construct homes for impoverished families on the reservation. One such project in Dennehotso provided a home for a family with a physically disabled child, selected by tribal leaders, who had been living in substandard conditions, some live without running water or electricity.

Brandon's dedication to serving marginalized communities through mentorship, education, and hands-on support reflects his deep commitment to making a tangible difference in the lives of others. His contributions deserve recognition for their lasting impact on Navajo youth and beyond.

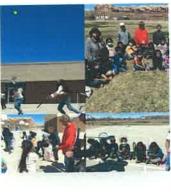

CLE: CLE Revenue caught up to budget amounts YTD from July, with the addition of the Litigation section sponsoring Civility Day, held at Little America. Program services expenses are unfavorable by (\$39,525), mainly due expenses related to Civility Day and other Section events not yet closed.

<u>Summer Convention:</u> The Summer Convention/Annual Meeting was held in June 2025, so all revenues and expenses associated with it were booked into the last fiscal year. This change was after the budget was already created, and therefore the numbers here only represent our July Online Series that would have normally been combined with the Summer Convention/Annual Meeting. As a result, there is a net shortfall when compared to budget of 30%, or \$(33,230)

Friday, August 22, 2025

Also in Attendance: Executive Director Elizabeth A. Wright, Assistant Executive Director Aubrey Schade, General Counsel Maribeth LeHoux, Communications Director Jennifer Weaver.

1. President's Welcome and Reports

1.1 Retreat Schedule and Events

Ms. Wright discussed the schedule for the evening, including dinner at 6:30. Tomorrow breakfast will be before the meeting, which begins at 8:30. The retreat meeting will be about crisis management/communications and communication strategies.

1.2 Report on "Commission Speaks" in Vernal

As part of an effort to connect with lawyers and judges outside of the Wasatch front, Mr. Young organized a CLE in Vernal, which took place in July. Over 20 people attended, including two judges, one of whom presented. In addition to the CLE, they discussed JPEC. Mr. Young intends to hold 10-12 more meetings in rural areas and smaller cities throughout the state.

1.3 Report on National Conference of Bar Presidents Meeting

Ms. Cordova provided a report on the national conference, which included a focus on AI. Ms. Wright talked about the National Conference of Bar Executives meeting she attended.

1.4 Report on New Mexico State Bar Annual Conference

Ms. Tangaro discussed the conference which she attended. Bryan Johnston (*Just Mercy*) was the guest speaker. Discussions included ideas for generating income.

1.5 Report on Attorney Oath Video

Ms. Wright discussed the video, which included different attorneys reciting the attorney oath. The video focuses on the importance of the oath and what it means.

1.6 Dates to Calendar

Ms. Wright highlighted the following dates and upcoming events:

- Access to Justice Summit October 3, 2025. 8-5 at the Utah Law and Justice Center
- Admissions Ceremony October 7, 2025 at the Grand Theatre and Salt Lake Community College South City Campus
- Fall Forum November 13-14, 2025 at Little America. Ms. Cordova emphasized the importance of having more commissioners there. Ms. Khaosanga suggested a panel with commissioners
- November 19 annual lawyer/legislator breakfast. 7:30 am at the Capitol
- September Constitution Day. There is info and materials on the website created for lawyers and the public. This is the Bar's first initiative of civic education

2. Information Items

2.1 Court Response to Bar Audit

Ms. Cordova discussed the audit conducted by the Court Auditor with the assistance of the State Auditor. Before the Court audit was reviewed and accepted by the Utah Supreme Court, former State Auditor John Dougall took it upon himself to write a letter to the legislature giving his opinion about Bar license fees and programs he sees as useful or inappropriate. The legislature is very interested in Mr. Dougall's letter because it is critical of the Supreme Court. Accordingly, the legislative Rules and Review and General Oversight Committee scheduled a hearing to discuss Mr. Dougall's opinions about the regulation of the practice of law in Utah. Elizabeth Wright and the Court's lobbyist Michael Drechsel appeared before the Committee. The Commission discussed the hearing.

2.2 ABA House of Delegates Meeting and ABA Annual Meeting

Mr. Christiansen provided an update on the Annual ABA Meeting. Ms. Shimada, Mr. Alder, and Ms. Khaosanga attended. He discussed the importance of involvement, and some of the important resolutions that passed.

3. Action Items

3.1 Appoint 2nd Division Commissioner to Replace Matt Hansen

Ms. Cordova discussed the opening created by Mr. Hansen's appointment to the bench. It is a full 3-year term since he just ran. The Commission discussed both candidates, who were both extremely qualified. The Commission requested statements of interest from the candidates and would vote by email once they have the additional requested materials.

3.2 Appoint YLD ABA Delegate

After a discussion about the candidates, Ms. Cordova made a motion to appoint Nicole Johnson as the YLD ABA delegate. Ms. Khaosanga seconded, and the motion was approved, with one Commissioner voting in opposition.

3.3 Appoint Committee Chairs

Update: For the Awards Committee Adam Bondy and Martin Stulz (both current committee members) are nominated as chairs.

Update: For the Innovation in Law Committee, Nick Haffen and Anastacia Boyko are nominated as chairs.

Ms. Allred made a motion to appoint the Committee Chairs as presented, including the updates. Ms. Mancuso-Smith seconded, and the motion was unanimously approved.

3.4 Appoint Commission Liaisons

The Commission discussed the role of committee liaisons. Ms. Couser and Ms. Allred switched their positions (UPL to Ms. Couser and Lawyers Helping Lawyers to Ms. Allred).

Ms. Cordova made a motion to approve the Commission Liaison appointments. Ms. Allred seconded, and the motion was unanimously approved.

3.5 Purchase Table for Legal Aid Society

BYLAWS OF THE APPELLATE PRACTICE SECTION OF THE UTAH STATE BAR

Article 1. Identification

- 1.1 Creation. The Appellate Practice Section of the Utah State Bar ("the Section") was established pursuant to Article II, section 2 of the bylaws of the Utah State Bar ("the Bar") to accomplish the purposes set forth therein.
- 1.2 Purpose. The purposes of the Section shall be: to inform, educate, and train members of the Bar about written and oral appellate advocacy; to provide a forum for identifying, analyzing, and taking action on issues or current developments of particular concern to appellate practitioners; to create a professional organization through which appellate practitioners can provide input to the judicial system, the judicial advisory committees on rules of practice, the judicial nominating commissions, the legislature, the media, and the public about appellate practice and the appellate courts; and to undertake such other services as may be of benefit to members of the legal profession and the public.
- 1.3 Limitations. These bylaws have been adopted subject to the applicable Utah statutes and bylaws of the Bar.
- 1.4 Principal Office. The principal office of the Section shall be maintained in the offices of the Bar.
- 1.5 Fiscal Year. The fiscal year of the Section shall coincide with that of the Bar.

Article 2. Membership

- **2.1 Enrollment.** Any Bar member in good standing may, upon request of the Secretary of the Bar, be enrolled as a member of the Section upon payment of annual Section dues in the amount, and for the purposes, approved by the Board of Commissioners of the Bar.
- **2.2 The Membership.** Members enrolled as provided in section 2.1 of these bylaws shall constitute the Membership of the Section
- 2.3 Dues. The Section shall impose annual dues in the amount of \$2+5.00, which shall be collected by the Bar along with Bar membership dues or by the Section at Section meetings. Complimentary membership shall be offered to the current judges and justices of the Utah Court of Appeals and Utah Supreme Court.

Article 3. Meetings of the Membership

- **3.1 Annual Meeting.** The annual meeting of the Membership shall be held at a time determined by the Executive Committee of the Section and following notice to the Membership.
- **3.2 Quorum.** The members of the Section present at any meeting shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of Section affairs.
- 3.3 Controlling Vote. Action of the Section shall be by majority vote of the Section members present.
- **3.4 Agenda**Elections. Section Officers and any other non-appointed Executive Committee members shall be elected at the annual meeting of the Section by plurality vote of the Section members present.
- **3.5 Special Meetings.** Special Meetings of the Membership of the Section may be called by any Section Officer, to be held at such time and place as the Section Officers may determine.

Article 4. The Executive Committee

- **4.1 Powers.** The Executive Committee shall be vested with the powers and duties necessary for the administration of the affairs of the Section.
- **4.2 Composition.** The Executive Committee shall be composed of the Officers of the Section, up to two Section members elected at the annual meeting of the Section, and any additional members a majority of the Section Officers may appoint. The Executive Committee shall have no more than 25 members, excluding the Section Officers.
- **4.3 Controlling Vote.** Action of the Executive Committee shall be by majority vote of the Executive Committee. A member of the Executive Committee may vote in absentia by instructing the Section's Secretary/Treasurer in writing of the manner in which such vote is to be cast.
- **4.4 Meetings.** The annual meeting of the Executive Committee shall be held in conjunction with the annual meeting of the Section. Monthly meetings of the Executive Committee shall be held at a time and place (including virtually) as designated by the Section Officers of the Section. Special meetings of the Membership may be called by any Section Officer, to be held at such time and place as the Section Officers may determine. A meeting is not essential to action by the Executive Committee, provided response to any proposed Section action is elicited from all members of the Executive Committee.
- 4.5 Terms. Executive Committee members shall serve a renewable term of two (2) years, expiring on the date of the annual meeting. To renew their term, the member shall provide a written request to the Chair and Chair-Elect prior to the annual meeting in the year their term expires. If a member does not request to renew their term by the annual meeting, their term expires and the Officers of

the Section shall make the position available and a new member elected from the general membership at the annual meeting.

4.6. Minimum Participation. All members of the Executive Committee shall attend no less than 50% of the monthly meetings of the Executive Committee, absent good cause. Any Executive Committee member who does not attend at least 50% of the monthly meetings may shall be released from their duties as an Executive Committee member, unless good cause is shown and determined at the sole discretion of the Section Officers.

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Article 5. Officers

5.1 Officers. The Officers of the Section ("Section Officers") shall be the Chair, the Chair-Elect, and the Secretary/Treasurer.

5.2 Chair. The Chair shall preside at all meetings of the Section and of the Executive Committee. The Chair shall formulate and present at each annual meeting of the Bar a report of the work of the Section during the preceding year. The Chair shall perform such other duties as usually pertain to the office or as may be delegated by the Executive Committee.

5.3 Chair-Elect. Upon the death, resignation, or during the disability of the Chair, or upon the Chair's refusal to act, the Chair-Elect shall perform the duties of the Chair for the remainder of the Chair's term office, except in cases of disability, in which the Chair-Elect shall perform the duties of the Chair only during so much of the remaining term as the disability continues. The Chair-Elect, or any designated member of the Section's Executive Committee, will act as liaison to the Bar's Governmental Relations Committee.

5.4 Secretary/Treasurer. The Secretary/Treasurer shall be the custodian of all books, papers, documents, and other property of the Section. The Secretary/Treasurer shall keep a true record of all accounts and of the meetings of, and actions taken by, the Section and of the Executive Committee. In conjunction with the Chair, and as authorized by the Executive Committee, the Secretary/Treasurer shall attend generally to the business of the Section. Article 6. Elections

6.1 Elective Offices. At the Section's first annual meeting, the Membership shall elect a Chair, a Chair-Elect, and a Secretary/Treasurer, and up to two Section members to serve on the Executive Committee. At subsequent annual meetings, the Membership shall elect a Secretary/Treasurer and up to two-Section members to serve on the Executive Committee sufficient to fill all vacancies on the Executive Committee.

6.2 Vacancies During Terms of Office. In the event of a vacancy in the office of Chair-Elect, the Secretary/Treasurer shall automatically succeed to the office of Chair-Elect. The Chair may then call a Special Meeting for an election to fill a vacancy in the office of the

Secretary/Treasurer. In the event that the Secretary/Treasurer is vacant at the time of the office of Chair-elect becomes vacant, the Chair may call a Special Meeting for an election to fill the vacancies in both offices.

- **6.3** Chair. The Chair-elect shall automatically succeed to the office of the Chair at the end of the Chair's term of office. In the event the office of Chair-Elect is vacant at the end of the Chair's term of office, the Secretary/Treasurer shall automatically succeed to the office of the Chair. In the event that both the offices of Chair-Elect and Secretary/Treasurer are vacant at the end of the Chair's term of office, a Chair shall be elected at the annual meeting in accordance with sections 6.5 and 6.6 of this Article.
- **6.4 Chair-Elect.** The Secretary/Treasurer shall automatically succeed to the office of the Chair-Elect at the end of the Chair-Elect's term of office. In the event that the office of the Secretary/Treasurer is vacant at the end of the Chair-Elect's term of office or the Secretary/Treasurer has succeeded to the office of Chair, a Chair-Elect shall be elected at the annual meeting in accordance with section **6.5** and **6.6** of this Article.
- **6.5 Nominations.** Nominations for any office or elected position, whether at the annual meeting of the Section or at other times to fill vacancies in these offices and positions, shall be made from the floor by a Section member.
- **6.6 Voting.** All elections shall be by written ballot or virtual voting, unless otherwise ordered by resolution duly adopted by the Section at the meeting at which the election is being held. Each Section member, including each Officer and Executive Committee Member, is entitled to vote.
- 6.7 Terms of Office. Each <u>Section</u> Officer's and each other Executive Committee member's term of elect office shall begin (a) with the adjournment of the annual meeting or other meeting held to fill a vacancy in an office or position following his or her election or (b) the time her or she succeeds to office pursuant to sections 6.2, 6.3, or 6.4, and shall end at the adjournment of the next annual meeting at which a successor <u>Section</u> Officer or other Executive Committee member has been elected.

Article 7. Substantive Responsibilities

7.1 Committees. The Chair may appoint committees to perform such duties and exercise such powers as the Executive Committee may direct.

Article 8. Amendments

8.1 Amendment of Bylaws. These bylaws may be amended at any meeting of the Section by a majority vote of the Section members present and voting, provided that no amendment so adopted shall become effective until approved by the Board of Commissioners of the Bar.

The following is a report of the meeting of the Fund for Client Protection a/k/a Client Security Fund which was held September 26, 2025 at the Law and Justice Center. The members of the Committee who were present are Steve Farr, Linda Barclay Mount, David Leta, Brad Mumford, and Yuchen Cook. Also present were Christine Greenwood and Barbara Townsend, Office of Professional Conduct Disciplinary Counsel, and Staff Liaison Christine Critchley. The Committee considered various claims and provides the following summary and recommendations:

A. Claimant: Amber Stephens
Involved Attorney: Richard L. King
Disciplinary Status: Deceased 1/04/2025

Disciplinary Status: Deceased 1/04/2025

<u>FACTS:</u> Mr. King was hired by Ms. Stephens to represent her in a class C misdemeanor case. Ms. Stephens paid Mr. King the sum of \$8,000 for his services. Some initial filings and work occurred but Mr. King became ill and died. The Committee agreed that Mr. King earned some of the attorney fees, but that the claimant should be refunded the unearned portion of the retainer.

RECOMMENDATION: The Committee unanimously recommended that Ms. Stephens be awarded the sum of \$6,000.

B. Claimant: Royce Mailolo
Involved Attorney: Richard L. King
Disciplinary Status: Deceased 1/04/2025

<u>FACTS:</u> Mr. Mailolo paid \$10,000 to Mr. King for representation on a child custody matter and modifications to previous decree. Mr. King provided some initial work on the case, but then became ill and died. The Committee agreed that Mr. King had done some work, but the claimant should be refunded most of the retainer that he paid.

RECOMMENDATION: The Committee unanimously recommended that Mr. Mailolo be awarded the sum of \$9,000.

C. Claimant: Teren Young
Involved Attorney: Richard L. King
Disciplinary Status: Deceased 1/04/2025

Disciplinary Status. Deceased 1/0 1/2020

FACTS: Ms. Young hired Mr. King to represent her in a child custody matter. She paid Mr. King the sum of \$10,000. The Committee found that Mr. King had not performed any meaningful services.

RECOMMENDATION: The Committee unanimously recommended that Ms. Young be awarded the sum of \$10,000.

D. Claimant: Justin Anthony
Involved Attorney: Richard L. King

Disciplinary Status: Deceased 1/04/2025

FACTS: Mr Anthony's father paid Mr. King \$50,000 to represent their son in a criminal matter. Mr. King appeared at a couple of hearings and did some initial work on the case but then became ill and died. The committee agreed that Mr. Anthony's parents are owed the unearned portion of the retainer up to the maximum \$20,000 award the Fund can pay out.

RECOMMENDATION: The Committee unanimously recommends that Mr. Anthony's father, David K. Anthony, be awarded the sum of \$20,000.

E. Claimant: Bryan Engelbert
Involved Attorney: Richard L. King
Disciplinary Status: Deceased 1/04/200

Disciplinary Status: Deceased 1/04/2025

<u>FACTS</u>: Mr. Engelbert paid a fee of \$11,600 to Mr. King to represent him in a defamation matter. Mr. King represented the client during a couple of minor status hearings and did perform some meaningful legal services before becoming ill. The Committee unanimously agreed that Mr Engelbert should be reimbursed the unearned portion of the retainer.

RECOMMENDATION: The Committee recommends that Mr. Engelbert be awarded \$5,000.

F. Claimant: Brady Gale
Involved Attorney: Richard L. King

Disciplinary Status: Deceased 1/04/2025

<u>FACTS:</u> Mr. Gale retained the services of Richard L. King. He paid Mr. King \$16,000 to represent him in two matters, a criminal case and a child custody case. Mr. King did perform some services on the criminal case but became ill and died before he could work on the custody case. The Committee agreed that Mr. Gale should be reimbursed for the portion of the unearned retainer.

RECOMMENDATION: The Committee recommends that Mr. Gale be awarded \$10,000.

G. Claimant: Amy Hadden
Involved Attorney: Richard L. King
Disciplinary Status: Deceased 1/04/2025

FACTS: Ms. Hadden retained the services of Richard L. King. Her father paid Mr. King \$19,000 to represent her in a custody matter. Mr. King did some work on the case and the Committee deemed the value of Mr. King's services prior to Mr. King's death was worth \$10,500. The claimant stated that if she received an award, it should be paid to her father. The Committee unanimously agreed that Ms. Hadden's father be awarded the sum of \$8,500.

RECOMMENDATION: The Committee recommends that Ms. Hadden's father Tom Hadden be awarded \$8,500.

H. Claimant: Michael Cowles
Involved Attorney: Jacque Ramos

Disciplinary Status: 2-year suspension 3/24/2024

FACTS: Mr. Cowles retained the services of Jacque Ramos. He paid Ms. Ramos \$1,500 to represent him in a matter involving a branded title to his car and pursuing a fraud case against the dealership that sold it to him. No meaningful services were performed on the case. The Committee agreed that Mr. Cowles should receive the amount of his retainer back.

RECOMMENDATION: The Committee recommends that Mr. Cowles be awarded \$1,500.

I. Claimant: Deloris Nnah

Involved Attorney: Nicholas Chamberlain

Disciplinary Status: Delicensed/Disbarment on 8/25/2025

Formerly suspended

FACTS: Ms. Nnah retained the services of Nicholas Chamberlain. She paid \$5,000 to represent her in a custody matter. Some meaningful services were performed on the case, but then the attorney was dishonest about the rest of the case, implying that things were done that weren't. The Committee agreed that Ms. Nnah should receive the unearned portion of the retainer.

RECOMMENDATION: The Committee recommends that Ms. Nnah be awarded \$2,500.

J. Claimant:

Megan Norris

Involved Attorney:

Nicholas Chamberlain

Disciplinary Status:

Delicensed/Disbarment on 8/25/2025

Formerly suspended

FACTS: Ms. Norris failed to appear to the hearing, and the committee did try to contact her during the hearing, but she did not respond. The case will be tabled for a future hearing.

RECOMMENDATION: The Committee unanimously recommends that the case be rescheduled.

The Committee has made recommendations that \$72,500. be paid out as compensation for the above-referenced claims. With these payments, the Fund's balance would be approximately \$140,608. Please contact me with any comments or questions
