Points From Charlotte Miller's Bar Commission Leadership Workshop (August 23, 2014)

- 1. Remember why you joined the Commission what are your goals?
- 2. Remember your goals are probably the same and/or similar to your colleagues on the Commission, even if you think you come from a different perspective than everybody else.
- 3. Being on the Commission is a privilege not a chore. Develop a mindset of "I get to do X" instead of "I have to do X."
- 4. Attend all Commissions meetings; study the materials beforehand. Focus 100% of your attention while there. Do not text, or do other work during Commission meetings. Be engaged. Listen carefully. Offer thoughtful comments that are in the best interest of the Bar. Follow through. Make a difference.
- 5. Your time on the Commission is short, especially ex-officio members. Make the most of it.
- 6. Remember your role: Bar staff can handle the day —to-day operations of the Bar. Your job is big picture and oversight.
- 7. Charlotte encouraged the Commissioners to think about what consensus means to each of them and how they should not try to undermine a decision after it is made.
- 8. If you do not like someone you have to work with, use strategies to get to know the person that will enable you to better work with the person or even begin to like her or him. Charlotte gave an example of making a point to speak every day with a co-worker she thought was difficult.
- 9. Encourage and mentor others along in Bar leadership. Remember your Bar story, which probably included an invitation from a Bar leader to help.
- 10. Talk often about the Bar's Vision and Mission statement, to focus your work in a way that is consistent with those statements.
- 11. Charlotte conducted exercises that encouraged Commissioners to think about the decision making process. Groups were given scenarios with different difficult decisions to make and asked to reach decisions while considering the following factors:
 - a. What facts do they need? Data is very important to good decision making
 - b. What should the process be?
 - c. What unwritten Bar traditions impact the final decision?
 - d. How does the culture of the Bar impact the decision?
 - e. What items in Bar governance materials are relevant to the process?

I write with great pleasure to nominate Marlesse Jones of the Layton City Attorney's Office for the Dorathy Merrill Brothers Award. Ms. Jones works tirelessly for the advancement of Women in the Legal Profession. Ms. Jones' professionalism, dedication to enhancing the public welfare, and serving the underserved all qualify her for the award. As the father to three daughters, I am glad that they have a role model like Ms. Jones who is an example of a women who has intelligence, integrity, and compassion.

Currently, Ms. Jones serves as the Layton City Prosecutor where she personally oversees a caseload in excess of 5,500 misdemeanor and traffic cases. She has served in this position since 2011. When she began her career as the City Prosecutor, she was the only full-time City Prosecutor in Davis County. In fact, I believe she was the only woman in the county to serve as head of the prosecuting agency regardless of their full- or part-time status. In the end, I believe that Ms. Jones' wisdom helped this intern make the correct decision for her situation.

Ms. Jones has taken a special interest in Domestic Violence offenses. She works tirelessly on DV victims behalf on several fronts. As mentioned above, she vigorously prosecutes Domestic Violence Offenders. She also regularly presents in front of the state legislature, prosecution groups, and victim advocacates. Ms. Jones broad knowledge base has benefitted victims of Domestic Violence across the state. These presentations have, doubtlessly, advanced and inspired other women to improve the legal profession. Further, Ms. Jones has been a panelist at the University of Utah on Women in the law, legal research issues, and prosecution topics. (h) two trial judges and an appellate judge appointed by the chair of the Judicial Council;

(i) two juvenile court judges designated by the chair of the Judicial Council:

(j) an attorney in private practice who is a member of the Utah State Bar, experienced in criminal defense, and appointed by the Utah Bar Commission:

(k) an attorney who is a member of the Utah State Bar, experienced in the defense of minors in juvenile court, and appointed by the Utah Bar Commission;

(I) the director of Salt Lake Legal Defenders or a designee appointed by the director;

(m) the attorney general or a designee appointed by the attorney general;

(n) a criminal prosecutor appointed by the Statewide Association of Public Attorneys;

(o) a juvenile court prosecutor appointed by the Statewide Association of Public Attorneys;

(p) a representative of the Utah Sheriff's Association appointed by the governor;

(q) a chief of police appointed by the governor;

(r) a licensed professional appointed by the governor who assists in the rehabilitation of adult offenders;

(s) a licensed professional appointed by the governor who assists in the rehabilitation of juvenile offenders;

(t) two members from the public appointed by the governor who exhibit sensitivity to the concerns of victims of crime and the ethnic composition of the population; and

(u) one member from the public at large appointed by the governor

Bar Committee Succession

(2)(a) Committee Leadership Succession

It is the policy of the Utah State Bar that Bar Committees provide regular, ongoing leadership opportunities for its committee members. Committees shall have a succession plan which may be unique to that committee, but shall address leadership and succession. Suggested guidelines are that each committee should have a chair and a chair-elect. A committee chair should serve a term to be approved by the Commission, but should not exceed thee (3) years. The chair-elect should be nominated by the committee membership as a whole and approved by the Commission. The chair-elect should automatically become chair of the committee upon the end of the chair's term. Committees may propose a deviation from these guidelines if factors unique to that committee justify a deviation and the basis for the deviation is set forth in the committee succession plan. Any deviations must be approved by the Commission.

In furtherance of the objectives outlined by the Futures Commission, I have been asked to report to the Bar Commission summarizing the debate about allowing lawyers to share fees and partner with non-lawyers in order to increase innovation and encourage lawyers to be more client focused.

RATIONALE BEHIND RULE 5.4

Rule of Professional Conduct 5.4 prohibits lawyers from sharing fees with a non-lawyer. The fee sharing restriction in Rule 5.4 ensures that a lawyer maintains independent professional judgment and loyalty to the client. This judgment and loyalty would be compromised if a lawyer also owes duties to shareholders and/or non-lawyer partners or investors who are not bound by the Rules of Professional Conduct.

NOTE: The Limited Licensed Paralegals (LPPs) Rules of Professional Conduct and Discipline Subcommittee has recommended changes to 5.4 to allow LPPs to form partnerships and share fees with lawyers as long as LPPs do not have a controlling interest in the law firm and do not supervise lawyers. This memo addresses fee sharing and partnerships with individuals and entities other than LPPs.

ALTERNATIVE BUSINESS STRUCTURES

Proponents of lifting the 5.4 fee sharing restriction argue it will allow for the creation of alternative business structures ("ABS") for the delivery of legal services and thereby enable lawyers to diversify the range of legal services provided and to better serve clients. Lifting the restriction will also law firms to attract new sources of investment and capital.

An additional advantage of allowing ABSs for lawyers is that it would provide a consistent and overreaching framework for the regulation of not just lawyers, but of all providers of legal services and law-related services in our jurisdiction.

ISSUE

Should the Commission empanel a committee to propose changes to Rule of Professional Conduct 5.4 in order to allow Alternative Business Structures for lawyers beyond those that would be allowed with LPPs?

ANSWER

I advise first speaking to the Court to get a sense of whether it would be open to such a radical change in our rules. If yes, Utah would be the second U.S. jurisdiction to make such a change. Washington D.C. is the only U.S. jurisdiction that allows lawyers to partner and share fees with non-lawyers. If the Court desires this change, then a committee should be empanelled to study and propose changes to Rule 5.4. The committee would be established to study fee sharing and partnerships with service providers other than LPPs such as accountants, financial planners, counselors, and investors.

ABA POSITION ON THE ISSUE

In May 2016, the ABA Commission on the Future of the Legal Profession failed to present the House of Delegates with an ABS rule because membership was vehemently opposed to the proposed ABS rule that had been sent out for comment. This was not the first time the ABA declined to propose a rule allowing ABS for lawyers. In 2012, the ABA Commission on Ethics 20/20 considered making changes to Rule 5.4 to permit non-lawyer ownership of law firms. A draft proposal to modify the non-lawyer ownership rule to be similar to Washington D.C.'s was released for public comment. The response was overwhelmingly negative and the ABA Commission declined to make any changes saying that the case for making changes had not been made.

WHAT OTHER JURISDICITIONS ARE DOING

Other jurisdictions have proposed changes to Rule 5.4 without success. In 2000, the State Bar of Arizona Task Force on the Future of the Legal Profession supported the multidisciplinary practice concept and proposed revisions to Rule 5.4. However, in 2002, the Arizona Bar Board of Governors tabled the proposal indefinitely. In 2011, North Carolina considered but did not pass a bill that would have allowed up to 49 percent non-lawyer ownership of law firms. In 2012, the New York State Bar Association Task Force on Non-lawyer Ownership recommended no changes to Rule 5.4 stating that "the absence of compelling need, empirical data, or pressure for change, combined with professionalism concerns, all militate against changing New York's position on non-lawyer ownership."

Washington D.C. Washington D.C. is the only United States jurisdiction that allows some forms of ABS for lawyers. The District of Columbia's version of Rule 5.4 permits a lawyer to practice law in a partnership or other form of organization in which non-lawyers hold a financial interest or have managerial authority if:

(1) the partnership or organization has as its sole purpose providing legal services to clients;

- (2) all persons having managerial authority or holding a financial interest abide by the Rules of Professional Conduct;
- (3) the lawyers who have a financial interest or managerial authority are responsible for the non-lawyers participants to the same extent as if the non-lawyers were lawyers under Rule 5.1 (Responsibilities of Partners, Managers and Supervisory Lawyers);
 - (4) these conditions are set forth in writing; and
- (5) a person who recommends, employs, or pays the lawyer to render legal services for another to direct or regulate the lawyer's professional judgment in render legal services.

Other Common Law Jurisdictions. The United Kingdom, Canada and Australia have changed their lawyer regulatory structures to allow ABS's for lawyers. I have a collection of articles that explain ABS rules in other common law jurisdictions. A full explanation of those rules is beyond the scope of this memo. However, I will be happy to compile the articles and provide an analysis of those rules if the Commission and the Court wish to move forward with changes to Rule 5.4.

1. President's Report: Rob Rice

- 1.1 Report on Fall Forum and UMBA Dinner. Rob Rice reported that both the Fall Forum and the UMBA dinner were well attended and that the Fall Forum had excellent programming. However, attendance numbers for the Fall Forum have been low two years in a row. There has not been a final recommendation from the Convention Review Committee, but it is probably best to go back to the one-day Fall Forum that has historically had excellent attendance and financial success.
- **1.2 Practice Portal Report.** John Lund and Cara Tangaro are looking at potential desktop practice management programs that would provide on desktop portal for e-filing, docket search and billing. They have met with a consultant and Court personnel and have looked closely at two potential programs.

A company called EKR did an analysis of the Bar's website and made recommendations for improvements. The Working Group sent out some RPIs for companies to make the recommended changes. The Working Group is still exploring pricing and options. The Working Group will report back at the next meeting regarding the cost to improve the website.

- 1.3 Status of WIPFLI Review. Still waiting for the final report.
- 1.4 Announce 50 Year Pin Distribution at April Commission Meeting. Herm Olsen reported that a Logan newspaper reporter has been very interested in the project as a good way to look into the history of the practice of law. The reporter has interviewed recipients in Herm Olsen's district. The Commission discussed other ways to honor these individuals including a luncheon at the April Commission Meeting.
- **1.5 Status of Innovation Committee Efforts.** Heather White and John Rees have met with a practice management consultant and will report at the January Commission meeting.
- **1.6 Announce Breakfast of Champions.** Michelle Mumford reported that the Breakfast will take place on February 23, 2017 at the Alta Club. Call for nominations is ready to go out in the next bar Journal and e-bulletin.
- 1.7 Remote CLE Project. Appellate Court Administrator James Ishida reported that the remote CLE pilot project has been going well. Early programs were in the First and Fifth Districts. The Court is rolling out the program slowly so that glitches can be ironed out and courthouse staff can work out procedures for administering the programs on their end. There are plans to have events in other districts before implementing the program state-wide.

2. Action Items

- 2.1 Futures Commission Items.
 - 2.1.1 Increased Judicial Case Management and Simplification of Family Law & Debt Collections Processes. The Domestic Case and Process Committee is a Court committee looking at issues in family law cases. The Committee has been meeting regularly since April 2016 and expects to have a report by July 2017.
 - 2.1.2 Simplification of Court Processes, Rules and Procedures to Enable Limited Scope Representation. Virginia Sudbury is Chair of the Limited Scope Representation Section and is trying to grow a debt collection clinic and other micro participation opportunities. Rob Rice asked the AAA Task Force to report and coordinate with the Court on efforts to increase limited scope representation.
 - 2.1.3 Changes to Licensing Requirements for Multistate Practices and Utah Lawyers Working for Out-of-State Clients. The Commission is interested in exploring the idea of a temporary practice rule pending admission to the Bar for lawyers who move to Utah from another jurisdiction. Rob asked that the Admissions, Character and Fitness and UPL Committees look at the issue.
- 2.2 Bar Committee Succession Planning. John Bradley and Katie Woods proposed three options for Section and Committee succession planning. The Commission preferred the option of giving Committees suggested rather than mandatory guidelines. Heather Farnsworth moved that the Commission select the second of three options subject

- to making the language consistent with existing Bar Bylaws. Kate Conyers seconded the motion which passed unopposed.
- 2.3 Small Firm Membership Services Tour. Grace Acosta reported that the small firm meetings that have taken place have been a tremendous success. More will take place after the New Year and she encouraged Commissioners to sign up to participate. Grace Acosta plans to organize meetings in the Fifth District in conjunction with the Spring Convention in St. George.
- **2.4** Social Media Limitations and Control Policy. The Commission discussed the proposed policy and asked Elizabeth Wright to add a section to cover quality control and a procedure for handling controversial issues.

3. Discussion Items

- **3.1 Legislation Session Orientation.** Frank Pignanelli and Stephen Foxley presented to the Commission regarding top issues of concern to the Bar for the 2017 legislative session and explained the updated procedures for the Governmental Relations Committee's discussion of legislation.
- 3.2 Leadership Academy Graduation and Placement. Liisa Hancock reported that the Leadership Academy has 42 applicants for the 2017 class. There are 12-14 spots available. Selection will be made in the coming weeks. Graduation for the 9 people in last year's class is still in the planning stages. Leadership Academy is working on getting graduates onto Bar committees. After a discussion regarding the Leadership Academy Board, Michelle Mumford made a motion to have the Bar President appoint a Leadership Academy Chair for approval by the Commission along with all of the other committee and section chair appointments made in August of each year. Katie Woods seconded the motion which passed unopposed.
- **3.3** Access to Justice in Utah Data. David McNeill from Open Legal Services gave a presentation about the statistics of legal representation in Utah which, among other things, demonstrated the need for lawyers in rural areas of the state.

4. Information Items

- **4.1** Limited Paralegal Practitioners Client Security Fund. Rob Rice reported that it is likely that there will be a client security fund for the Licensed Paralegal Practitioners (LPP) and flagged the issue of funding the LPP client security fund as one the Commission will have to address.
- **4.2 Licensed Lawyer & Social Media Promotion Follow Up.** Sean Toomey updated the Commission regarding his efforts to promote the Bar and Bar events on social media.

The meeting adjourned at 1:15 pm.

YTD net profit is \$2.1 million, which is \$170,000 (9%) ahead of budget. YTD revenue is \$78,000 (2%) ahead of budget mainly due to higher than budgeted Licensing, CLE and Investment income. YTD expenses are \$92,000 under budget mainly due to lower Licensing, CLE and Member Services expenses.

<u>YTD Net Profit — Cash Basis</u>: Adding back year-to-date depreciation expense of \$113,000 and deducting capital expenditures of \$25,000, the cash basis year-to-date net profit is approximately \$89,000 higher.

<u>Licensing</u>: At the end of December there were 9,326 and 2,779 active and inactive attorneys, respectively, for a total of 12,105 licensed attorneys. This number is up 2.4% from last year at this time. YTD Licensing revenue is just over \$4.1 million, which is \$21,000 (1%) ahead of budget while Licensing expenses total \$44,000, which is \$15,000 (25%) below budget. The lower spending is largely the result of staffing efficiencies.

Admissions: YTD Admissions revenue is \$178,000 which is approximately \$5,500 or 3% under budget, and, \$25,000 below where it was at this time last year mainly due to lower student exam fees. It is estimated that 135 people will sit for the Feb. 2017 Bar exam compared to 152 in Feb. 2016 (an 11% decline). Admissions expenses are \$252,000, or \$2,000 (1%) over budget due to higher ExamSoft fees and admissions ceremony expenses, partially offset by lower member database expenses.

<u>NLTP:</u> The NLTP Program has incurred a YTD loss of \$10,000 compared to a budgeted net loss of \$1,000. The higher than anticipated loss is mainly a result of lower NLTP fees collected this year relative to budget.

OPC: OPC spending it on track for the year at \$658,000.

<u>CLE</u>: CLE YTD revenue is \$263,000 compared to budgeted revenue of \$194,000. CLE expenses are under budget at \$158,000 compared to budget of \$189,000. These variances mainly result from timing differences between when event revenue is collected and expenses are incurred relative to the months in which they're budgeted.

<u>Summer Convention</u>: Summer Convention revenue of \$189,000 was just over the \$188,000 budget. Expenses are also just below budget, but it is estimated that an additional \$10,000 in staff and overhead

expenses will be incurred throughout the remainder of the fiscal year bringing the net loss for the year closer to \$18,000.

<u>Fall Forum:</u> Fall Forum revenue of \$129,000 exceeded the budget of \$122,000 mainly due to higher than budgeted registration revenue. Expenses total \$157,000 compared to budgeted expenses of \$148,000 due to higher food and beverage expenses.

<u>Member Services:</u> Member Services revenue is \$22,000 (13%) under budget due mainly to lower than expected Bar Journal advertising revenue. Member Services expenses are also under budget due in large part to lower than budgeted advertising expenses.

Public Services: Public Services spending is on track for the year at \$251,000.

<u>Bar Operations:</u> Bar Operations YTD revenue is \$35,000 higher than budget mainly due to how investment income was budgeted for and the fact that it has increased compared to last year from \$20,000 to \$33,000. YTD spending is right on budget with some areas being over budget (travel, food and beverages for staff and Commissioners attending the Summer Convention) and some areas being under budget (lower spending on salaries/benefits, database maintenance expenses, and outside consultants).

<u>Facilities:</u> Revenue from facilities usage continues to decline compared to prior years and is \$22,000 or 16% below budget thus far this year due to fewer events taking place at the Law & Justice Center. Likewise, YTD expenses are \$14,000 under budget as a result of fewer events. Below is a summary of facility usage by event type for the first four months of this year compared to the last two years:
