#### Points From Charlotte Miller's Bar Commission Leadership Workshop (August 23, 2014)

- 1. Remember why you joined the Commission what are your goals?
- 2. Remember your goals are probably the same and/or similar to your colleagues on the Commission, even if you think you come from a different perspective than everybody else.
- 3. Being on the Commission is a privilege not a chore. Develop a mindset of "I *get* to do X" instead of "I *have* to do X."
- 4. Attend all Commissions meetings; study the materials beforehand. Focus 100% of your attention while there. Do not text, or do other work during Commission meetings. Be engaged. Listen carefully. Offer thoughtful comments that are in the best interest of the Bar. Follow through. Make a difference.
- 5. Your time on the Commission is short, especially ex-officio members. Make the most of it.
- 6. Remember your role: Bar staff can handle the day —to-day operations of the Bar. Your job is big picture and oversight.
- 7. Charlotte encouraged the Commissioners to think about what consensus means to each of them and how they should not try to undermine a decision after it is made.
- 8. If you do not like someone you have to work with, use strategies to get to know the person that will enable you to better work with the person or even begin to like her or him. Charlotte gave an example of making a point to speak every day with a co-worker she thought was difficult.
- 9. Encourage and mentor others along in Bar leadership. Remember your Bar story, which probably included an invitation from a Bar leader to help.
- 10. Talk often about the Bar's Vision and Mission statement, to focus your work in a way that is consistent with those statements.
- 11. Charlotte conducted exercises that encouraged Commissioners to think about the decision making process. Groups were given scenarios with different difficult decisions to make and asked to reach decisions while considering the following factors:
  - a. What facts do they need? Data is very important to good decision making
  - b. What should the process be?
  - c. What unwritten Bar traditions impact the final decision?
  - d. How does the culture of the Bar impact the decision?
  - e. What items in Bar governance materials are relevant to the process?

# UTAH STATE BAR PROPOSED BUDGET FY 2016/17

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#### Utah State Bar Proposed Budget FY 2016/17 Commentary

#### Summary of Changes to Original FY2016/17 Proposed Budget (dated 4/29/16):

- Increased capital budget from \$125,000 to \$184,000 to provide \$50,000 for website updates and \$9,000 for computer equipment & software for YLD's Wills for Heroes program
- Updated Fall Forum budget to correspond to Committee's budget (revenue increased \$4,000 and expenses increased \$11,000)
- Increased Access to Justice's computer maintenance budget by \$2,500 to accommodate Licensed Lawyer
   Directory's annual hosting fee
- Increased YLD's budget by \$1,000 for computer supplies for Wills for Heroes program
- The net effect of these changes is to reduce budgeted net profit from \$146,449 to \$137,313 (a \$9,000 reduction) and to reduce budgeted net increase in cash for the year from \$283,674 to \$215,538 (a \$68,000 reduction).

#### **Summary of FY2016/17 Proposed Budget:**

The proposed budget provides for the continuation of all Bar programs, services and activities at current performance levels. Some key metrics are as follows:

- The current FY2015/16 budgeted net increase in cash was \$325,648
- The projected FY2015/16 net increase in cash is \$477,813
- The proposed FY2016/17 budgeted net increase in cash is \$215,538
- Projected cash reserves at June 30, 2016 are \$3,000,000
- The proposed budget increases total reserves at June 30, 2017 to \$3,216,000
- Bar Management and the Budget & Finance Committee have established the following designated reserves:

- Operations Reserve (4 months' operations)	\$ 2,028,000
- Capital Replacement Reserve (equipment)	200,000
- Capital Replacement Reserve (building)	650,000
Total designated reserves	\$ 2,878,000

#### General assumptions used in preparing the budget:

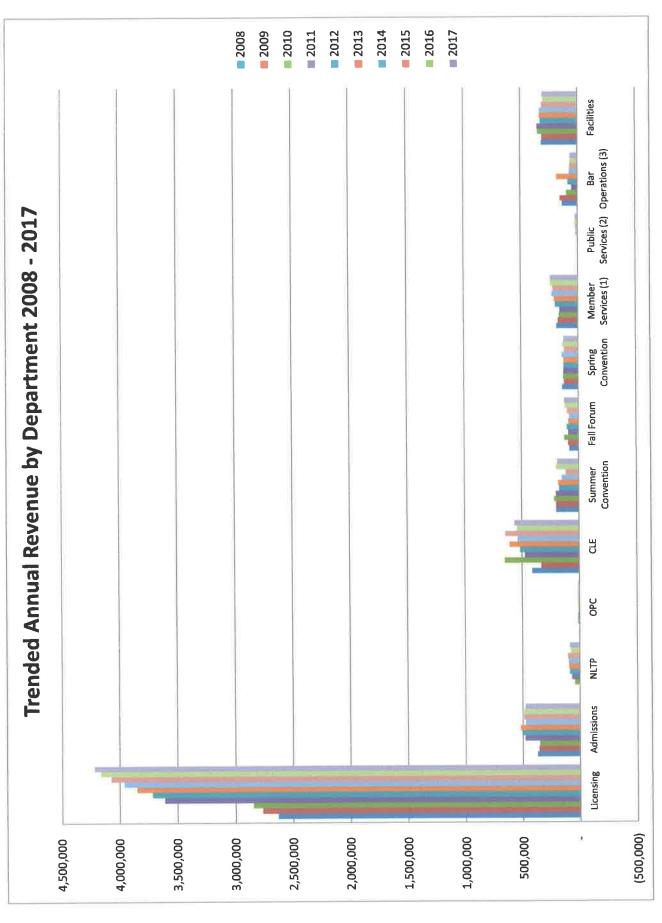
- Licensing revenue to increase 2% (except late fees)
- Admissions revenue to decline 2% (except late fees)
- Overall salaries to increase 4%
- Health insurance estimated to increase 20% effective 1/1/17
- Dental insurance to increase 5% effective 1/1/17
- Payroll taxes flat as a percent of salaries
- Other insurance (workers comp, property, E&O, etc) flat
- Building overhead expenses (utilities, repairs & maintenance, etc) to increase 5%
- Facilities revenue to increase 5% as new room rental pricelist goes into effect 7/1/16

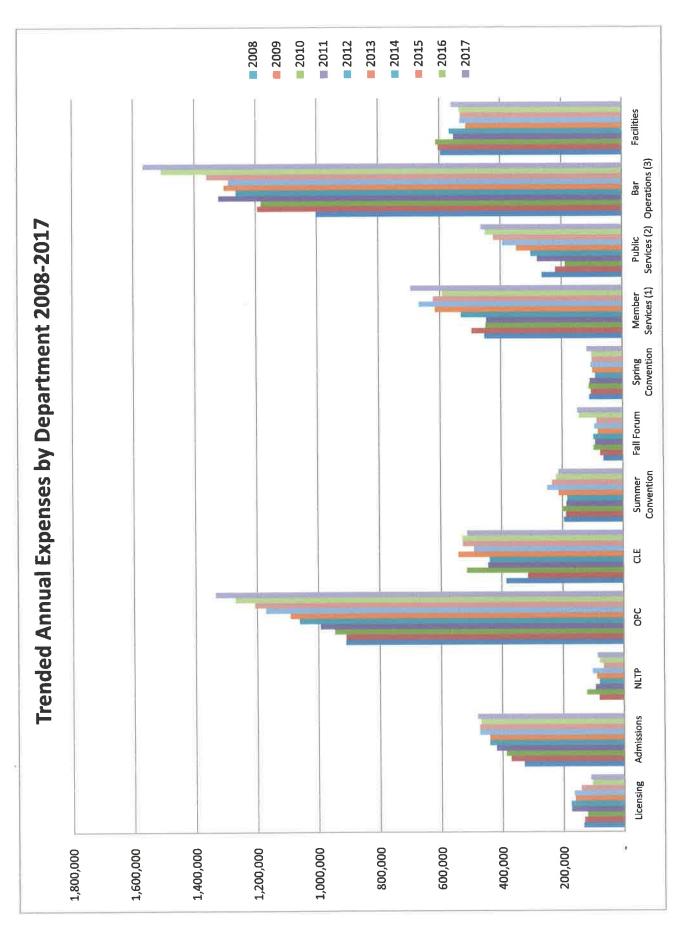
#### Other Highlights:

- \$30,000 budgeted for Wipfli operation audit
- \$75,000 budgeted for advertising of Licensed Lawyer Directory
- \$184,000 budgeted for capital expenditures
- Supreme Court Screening Panel meeting expenses moved from OPC to General Counsel
- Bar Mgmt and CLE overhead to be charged to Conventions beginning in FY2017 resulting in a shift in expenses away from CLE and Bar Mgmt to the Conventions (net zero impact to overall expenses)

#### **Summary by Department:**

- <u>Licensing</u> revenue to increase 2% except late fees which are budgeted to decline. Expenses to remain flat except salaries/benefits and general building overhead. (1 employee)
- <u>Admissions</u> revenue to decline 2% except retake and laptop fees which have been trending upward and late fees which are budgeted to decline. Expenses to be relatively flat except salaries/benefits and general building overhead. Overall Admissions department budgeted to break even. (3 employees)
- NLTP department budgeted to break even. (1 employee)
- <u>OPC</u> expenses, the bulk of which are salaries/benefits, are expected to increase, offset slightly by the transfer of expenses related to Supreme Court Screening Panel meetings to General Counsel. (10.75 employees)
- <u>CLE</u> anticipates a slight increase in revenue. Program expenses expected to decline as a portion of CLE overhead is charged to the conventions in accordance with the new overhead allocation policy. (2 employees)
- <u>Summer Convention</u> to be held in San Diego in July '16 is expected to draw fewer participants than Sun Valley, hence the reduction in budgeted revenue. However, expenses are anticipated to be less as Loews has no facility fees and a lower food & beverage minimum, though those savings are partially offset by higher travel costs for staff and Bar Mgmt/CLE overhead which will now be charged to conventions.
- <u>Fall Forum</u> revenue is expected to be flat compared to last year, however, expense savings are anticipated as the event is moved from Grand America to Little America, even with the Bar Mgmt/CLE overhead now being charged to the event.
- <u>Spring Convention</u> budget is expected to be flat compared to last year, except for Bar Mgmt/CLE overhead now being charged to the event.
- <u>Member Services</u> revenue, which mainly consists of Bar Journal advertising revenue and the section support administrative fee, is expected to remain flat while expenses are expected to increase due to higher legislative expenses (compared to FY16 which had very low legislative spending) and higher advertising expenses related to the roll out of the Licensed Lawyer Directory. (2.5 employees)
- <u>Public Services</u> revenue is expected to remain relatively flat while expenses increase slightly as result of higher salaries/benefits and general building overhead. (3.5 employees)
- <u>Bar Operations</u> revenue, which consists of e-filing revenue and investment income, is expected to be flat. Expenses are anticipated to increase due to salaries/benefits and general building overhead, the Wipfli operational audit, Supreme Court Screening Panel now budgeted in General Counsel, and additional budget for potential litigation expenses. These increases are expected to be partially offset by charging a portion of Bar mgmt overhead to the conventions in accordance with the new overhead allocation policy. (9 employees-3 Mgmt, 2 Finance, 2 General Counsel, 2 IT)
- <u>Facilities</u> revenue expected to increase slightly due to increase in room rental rates effective 7/1/16. Expenses expected to remain flat except salaries/benefits and general building overhead. (2.5 employees)

# 2016 Grant Application submitted to the Utah State Bar from Utah Dispute Resolution

# 1. Description, Mission, and History of Utah Dispute Resolution.

Utah Dispute Resolution (UDR) is giving low-income Utah residents greater access to justice by offering a collaborative option for addressing and resolving conflict. UDR's mission is to provide the residents of Utah with quality mediation services, information and training in alternative dispute resolution and the means to successfully, informally and cooperatively resolve their disputes.

Mediation is a collaborative approach for resolving disputes using the assistance of an impartial, third party who facilitates communication and helps disputing parties overcome communication barriers. In mediation, the parties retain control over all decisions; this factor results in greater compliance with agreements because disputants contribute to the provisions of resolution. Mediation provides greater access to justice because the process helps parties in dispute settle their differences more quickly within and outside of the judicial system.

UDR was founded in 1991 under the direction of the Utah State Bar with funding from the State Justice Institute. Since 1993, UDR has received funding from local foundations and training efforts to continue its activities. In 1996 UDR was incorporated as an independent entity and achieved status a tax-exempt 501(c)(3) charitable nonprofit organization by the Internal Revenue Service as in 1997.

UDR does not compete with private mediators or mediation firms. The organization targets Utah residents who can't afford the cost for a private mediator. UDR's clients need help resolving conflict, but they have limited financial resources to pay for services.

UDR's headquarters is located at the Law and Justice Center in Salt Lake City. The Utah State Bar Association generously provides office space as well as IT and accounting services. In 2007, UDR opened a satellite office in Ogden. In 2014, UDR consolidated staffing to the Salt Lake City as a way to reduce costs; the organization continues to maintain space in Ogden where mediations are conducted for residents in the northern part of our state.

UDR is a recognized leader in promoting the use of mediation in Utah. In 2008 the Dispute Resolution Section of the Utah State Bar presented its prestigious Peter W. Billings, Sr. Award to UDR for its contributions in promoting alternative dispute resolution. UDR maintains strong partnerships with the Utah State Bar, Utah Legal Services, Legal Aid Society of Salt Lake, the Utah court system, Utah schools, and the refugee communities in our state.

UDR oversees five programs: Family, Community, Court, Youth, and Training. A description of each program is included in Attachment A (page 9). In addition to mediation services, the organization provides instruction on conflict resolution and mediation skills for individuals, organizations, and youth. UDR is the longest-running provider of court-approved mediation training in Utah. Public and corporate training efforts provide a significant source of revenue that helps support UDR's service programs. UDR has realized steady growth over the years because mediation is recognized as an effective way to resolve disputes outside of court. The legal community has embraced the use of mediation, and UDR has achieved a reputation for providing quality, affordable services for people with financial need.

# 2. Officers, Directors and Employees of Utah Dispute Resolution.

Board of Trustees

UDR is governed by a Board of Trustees that sets policies for the organization in keeping with its mission statement and establishes a vision for the organization's growth and direction. The board also functions to establish legal and fiscal controls, raise funds, guarantee sound management, and advocate for the organization. UDR's Board includes:

# Contractors and Volunteers

Since its inception, UDR has operated on a service model that uses trained, qualified mediators who volunteer their time to provide services to the community. Many of these volunteers are licensed Utah attorneys who believe in the value of mediation and offer their expertise as neutral third party facilitators. By using volunteers, UDR is able to serve a large number of people with a small annual budget. Staff members are supplemented by several mediators to whom UDR pays a minimal stipend to coordinate mediations at court venues throughout the state. UDR also uses experienced private mediators who donate their time to assist with the delivery of training.

# 3. Request for Funding.

UDR is requesting \$20,000 from the Utah State Bar to help fund its mediation program for the 2016-2017 fiscal year. The requested funding represents about 7% of UDR's proposed annual operating budget for the 2016-2017 fiscal year (see Attachment B, page 10). About 81% of UDR's annual budget supports compensation and program expenses. The remaining 19% of the budget represents administrative costs.

UDR anticipates the need for additional financial support in the next fiscal year to fund three initiatives: 1) increase staff compensation to reduce turnover, maintain continuity, and improve the quality of intake processes, 2) redesign the UDR Web site to raise greater awareness of programs and add interactive intake forms to expedite the scheduling process, and 3) cover costs ri coordinate mediations for the Assisted Pro Se calendars in Third District Court.

Staff Compensation Increases. In the past year, UDR has experienced an unusually high staff turnover rate and has had difficulty recruiting qualified employees. This has resulted from a more competitive job market with many nonprofit organizations offering higher wages. This turnover has affected efficiencies in screening and scheduling mediations. By increasing compensation, UDR would anticipate maintaining higher employee retention rates, which would improve our ability to meet the high demand for mediations. We anticipate a 25% increase in wages from current levels. To achieve this, the organization would need an additional \$20,000 over last year's compensation budget. Wages have remained at an hourly range of \$10 to \$12; with increased funding, UDR hopes to offer more competitive rates in the \$13 to \$15 range.

Web Site Redesign. UDR's Web site is nearly ten years old. Redesigning the site would increase exposure and raise awareness of the organization's services. The redesign would include interactive forms, which would improve efficiencies in the intake and scheduling process. A lack of sufficient funding prevented UDR from completing this project last year as hoped. The redesign is expected to cost \$5,000.

# Assisted Pro Se Mediation Project.

UDR began a pilot domestic mediation program during the past fiscal year to assist Third District Commissioners in their efforts to expedite cases filed by unrepresented parties. Private attorneys volunteer their time, and the Court's Self-Help Center assists by preparing documentation. UDR oversees, trains, and schedules volunteer mediators for this program. To date, UDR volunteer mediators have conducted 85 mediations during these Pro Se calendars at the Matheson and West Jordan courthouses. Additional funding from the Bar will help defray costs to oversee this program and pay parking costs for volunteer mediators. The cost for UDR staff time, parking, and supplies totals \$6,500.

By contributing to UDR, the Utah State Bar would be giving low-income Utah residents another option for addressing and resolving conflict. In recent years, the Utah Bar has demonstrated its support for Utah's underserved populations by initiating pro-bono and modest means programs.

While UDR does not provide legal services, it does work in partnership with the legal community to help disputing parties talk about their differences and explore options for resolution. Mediation offers clients and their legal representatives an option for settling cases outside of court. Many low-income clients do not have the resources to embark on costly and lengthy litigation. Without UDR, these clients would have few options outside of court to find resolution. UDR is the only mediation center in Utah that offers services on a sliding scale based on need. The Legal Aid Society of Salt Lake brings most of its cases to UDR; other referrals come from Utah Legal Services, attorneys, and the court.

UDR has gratefully relied on the loyalty and generosity of the Utah State Bar over the years. Originally founded under the direction of the Bar, UDR has helped to fulfill the mission of the Law and Justice Center by providing access to justice and alternative methods for resolving disputes for Utahans who need financial consideration.

UDR continues to seek funding from new sources and strives to keep operating costs low. While service fees have generated a small percentage of operating revenue in recent years, this will never represent a major source of income because of the organization's mission to serve low-and middle-income Utah residents who need financial consideration. UDR will continue to rely on the generosity of individual donors, foundations, and organizations like the Utah State Bar to help fund programs that serve people in need.

# 4. Budget and Sources of Funding for Utah Dispute Resolution.

UDR operates on a fiscal year that runs from July 1 through June 30. With two months left in the current fiscal year, UDR anticipates a small profit by year end. This is the result of understaffing during period of employee turnover in the past year. Year-end projections for the current fiscal year are included as Attachment C (page 11).

# Revenue Received to Date

As of March 31, 2016, UDR had received \$177,286 in revenue for the 2015-2016 fiscal year. Year-end projections include:

# 2016-17FY

Later this month, UDR's Board of Trustees will be considering and approving a budget for the next fiscal year. A draft proposed budget is included as Attachment B of this proposal (page 10). Including in-kind donations, the proposed budget reflects increased funding to cover proposed compensation and Web site redesign costs.

# 5. Measurement of Effectiveness of Mediation Center.

UDR measures the effectiveness and quality of service by considering: (1) changes in case numbers and numbers of cases that result in mediation over time, (2) disposition of mediated cases, and (3) client assessment of services received. UDR maintains electronic records on all mediation cases using a tool that provides statistical reports on case type, referral source, and final outcome. This allows the organization to assess changes in referral sources, and numbers and types of cases over time.

Case Numbers. UDR tracks changes in the numbers of requests we receive to assist with conflict. UDR counts an inquiry as a "case" when our staff has communicated with both sides of the dispute. Last fiscal year, UDR recorded a total of 1,535 cases, which is 1% higher than the previous year. Of those cases, UDR volunteers conducted 908 mediations over all programs, which is slightly fewer than in the previous year.

Case Disposition. UDR tracks the disposition of cases to determine settlement rates. Last year, 63% of all mediations conducted through Utah Dispute Resolution resulted in full or partial agreement. The settlement rates vary based on the context of the dispute. The table below shows the number of mediations conducted and disposition rates for all UDR program areas.

Client Assessment. UDR asks all disputants who participate in mediation to complete opinion surveys. This information provides valuable feedback about mediator performance as well as general program service. Results from these opinion surveys reflect consistently high ratings. Last year, the average rating for mediations as well as UDR's overall service was 4.6 on a five point scale where 1 is "poor" and 5 is "excellent." UDR receives positive comments about services, regardless of the outcome of the mediation. Even when the parties do not reach agreement, clients find the process valuable because it helps them clarify interests and reach mutual understanding, if not agreement. Mediation has proven to be an effective tool that offers people in conflict a safe, respectful setting in which to talk about their differences and explore options for resolution. These high client ratings as well as the high number of referrals and mediations conducted is a testament to UDR's success.

# 6. Providers of Services.

UDR relies on the efforts of volunteers to carry out its mission. By using volunteers, UDR is able to serve a large number of people in the community with a minimal annual budget. Each year, about 75 active volunteers complete over 2,000 hours of service. Guided by UDR's small staff of mediation professionals, qualified volunteers perform essential tasks, including case management, mediations, and special projects.

Trained, qualified volunteers mediate disputes for UDR. Newly trained mediators have opportunities to gain experience in small claims court cases under the tutelage of experienced mediators. More experienced volunteers mediate appeals and community cases. A select group of highly skilled volunteers mediates family disputes. Volunteer mediators include professionals with a wide variety of backgrounds including attorneys, mental health practitioners, and human resource professionals.

Interns from local colleges and universities supplement office staff in conducting intake, coordinating volunteer efforts, and assisting with Spanish language interpretation. This year, UDR partnered the University of Utah and Weber State University to offer students practical experience in applying their knowledge and skills. Student interns and volunteers answer phones, conduct intake, and participate in small claims mediations, all under the guidance of UDR staff members. Interns and volunteers donated over 200 hours of time last year conducting intake, helping with case management, and completing special projects.

UDR also uses volunteers to assist the staff trainers with the mediator training seminars. Professional mediators and university instructors assist this effort by presenting relevant topics. In addition, experienced mediators assist as coaches during role-plays, giving valuable guidance to learners as they practice new skills. Volunteerism is critical to the efforts of UDR as it meets the needs of low- and middle-income members of our community who seek help resolving conflict.

# 7. Utah Dispute Resolution Fee Schedule.

UDR's fee structure varies based on the type of case. There is no charge to disputants who participate in UDR's Small Claims and Small Claims Appeals Court Program. Nor does UDR charge pro se litigants in the Assisted Pro Se Program. UDR provides these court mediations at no cost to the disputants or to the court system. UDR's Court and Domestic Pro Se programs provide opportunities for mediators to gain experience. These programs also help educate the public about mediation as an alternative process for resolving conflict. Among all UDR programs, 77% of mediations conducted last year were provided free of charge to both parties.

In UDR's Family Mediation Program, clients are assessed an administration fee of \$25. This fee encourages commitment from the disputing parties and raises some revenue for UDR to help offset a very small portion of costs for case management. Family Mediation clients are assessed a mediation fee based on a sliding scale that considers income and family size. Each client's fee is assessed individually. Clients who earn 150% or less of the Federal Poverty Level (FPL) pay nothing for mediation services. Clients whose incomes fall between 150% and 250% FPL pay \$40 per hour for mediation. Clients whose incomes fall between 250% and 350% FPL pay \$60 per hour for mediation. Clients whose incomes exceed 350% FPL pay \$80 per hour for mediation. Fees assessed in the Family Program go directly to the volunteer mediators. In recent years, the UDR Executive Director has conducted some of the higher-paying cases as a way to generate more revenue for the organization.

Last fiscal year, 92% of clients in UDR's Family Mediation program qualified for fee waivers or reduced fees; only 8% of clients paid a full fee. Typically, if one person pays full fee, the other party receives a waiver or fee reduction. 64% of clients earned less than 150% FPL; 19% of clients earned incomes between 150% and 250% FPL; 9% earned between 250% and 350% FPL; and 8% of clients earned more than 350% FPL.

For cases that don't involve a domestic relationship, the fee for mediation is determined on a sliding scale that is based on the amount of money in dispute. The graduated scale for these community mediations ranges from a \$20 flat fee to \$80 per hour paid by each party. Fees from the Community Mediation Program are split equally between UDR and the mediator. In some disputes where there is no dollar value, like neighbor or youth conflicts, mediation is provided at no charge.

# 8. Audited Financial Statement.

A copy of the 2015 audit report is attached to this proposal. This report covers the fiscal year from July 1, 2014 through June 30, 2015. The audit was conducted by Huizenga and Company.

# 9. Summary of the Bar's 2015 Contribution.

In 2015, the Utah State Bar Association contributed \$10,000 to Utah Dispute Resolution. This funding helped cover costs for case managers who conduct intake, screen cases to ensure mediation is appropriate and safe, schedule mediations, and provide ongoing support to volunteer mediators and clients.

Additionally, the Utah Bar contributed an in-kind donation that included office and mediation space, accounting and bookkeeping services, and Internet and phone support. The Bar also gave UDR reduced rates to rent conference rooms at the Law and Justice Center, where UDR holds training seminars. This in-kind contribution lowers UDR's operating costs and allows the organization to devote a larger percentage of our annual revenue to providing direct services to the public. A summary of these in-kind donations is included in Attachment D (page 12) of this proposal.

UDR's Board of Trustees and staff extend our appreciation to the Utah State Bar Commission for its continued and generous support. We hope the Commission is able to continue its support of UDR's efforts for the 2016-17 fiscal year.

# Attachment A

# **Utah Dispute Resolution Programs**

UDR provides services through five programs, including:

- Family Mediation Program—UDR provides mediation services for families that can't afford to hire a private mediator. These low- and moderate-income clients need assistance with divorce, divorce modification, parentage orders, elder care, family probate disputes, and other family issues. Bilingual staff and volunteers provide services in Spanish.
- Community Mediation Program—UDR provides mediation services for clients who need assistance with a variety of disputes that involve minimal to no monetary claim such as matters between neighbors, landlords and tenants, consumers and merchants, and managers and employees in the workplace. Other cases involve disagreements about debts, loans, billings, contracts, and property rights. These cases typically come to UDR prior to court filings. Clients have limited resources to find help in resolving their disputes.
- Court Mediation Program—UDR volunteer mediators provide on-demand mediation for litigants at various justice courts around the state, including Salt Lake City, Salt Lake County, West Valley City, Taylorsville, Logan City, and Ogden City. The organization also administers a mandatory mediation program for small claims cases that are appealed to district courts in Salt Lake and Davis counties. UDR receives no funding from the Utah court system for these efforts. UDR's Court Program offers new mediator trainees the opportunity to gain experience while providing a valuable service to the community.
- Youth Mediation Program—UDR has provided instruction on mediation and conflict resolution skills for students at the Horizonte alternative high school in Salt Lake City as part of a life skills curriculum since 1998. Students who complete UDR's mediation class may join a panel of student mediators who help their peers resolve disputes at Horizonte School and at other Salt Lake District schools as requested. This school year, 20 students participated as peer mediators.
- Training Program—UDR provides several training workshops for mediators including Basic Mediation, Domestic Mediation, Domestic Violence Awareness & Screening, and Refresher classes. UDR's training programs are the longest-running court-approved mediator training programs in Utah. The organization also provides customized training for organizations that request assistance in developing conflict management skills for managers, supervisors, and employees. These workshops generate revenue that supports UDR's mediation service programs for low-income Utahns. This year, UDR partnered with Southern Utah University by providing mediation instruction for SUU's new Conflict Resolution Certificate Program.

### Utah State Bar Board of Bar Commissioners Conflict of Interest Policy

The Utah State Bar (the Bar) is a 501 (c) 6 Utah non-profit corporation to which the Utah Supreme Court has delegated certain regulatory, membership and public service responsibilities pursuant to its Rules for Integration and Management. The Bar has established its mission as: "To represent lawyers in the State of Utah and to serve the public and the legal profession by promoting justice, professional excellence, civility, ethics, respect for and understanding of the law."

The Board of Bar Commissioners (the Commission) is composed of from thirteen to fifteen Commissioners, including the President, the President-elect, eleven elected lawyers representing five designated divisions, two public members appointed by the Utah Supreme Court, and various *ex officio* members designated by the Commission on an annual basis.

This Policy is to assure that the affairs of the Bar and its Commission are managed in an ethical manner, free from the temptations for inappropriate personal gain which conflicting desires may provide. There are no exceptions to this Policy.

The Bar expects each member of the Commission to avoid any activity, agreement, business investment or interest, or other situation, which is in conflict with the Bar's interests or interferes with the performance of that person's duties to the Bar and to represent the Bar in a manner consistent with the goals, objectives and policies of the organization.

The following Policy has therefore been adopted:

- 1. <u>Duty to the Bar.</u> Members of the Commission have a clear fiduciary obligation to the Bar in connection with their service in such capacity. At all times Commissioners shall act in a manner consistent with this fiduciary obligation and shall exercise particular care that no detriment to the interests of the Bar (or appearance of such detriment) may result from a conflict between those interests and any personal interests which the individual Commissioner may have, or between the interests of the Bar and the Commissioner's interests as a voting member of the Commission.
- 2. <u>Areas of Potential Conflict.</u> Conflicts of interest could arise in situations in which Commissioners may have the opportunity to influence the Bar's or Commission's business decisions in ways that could lead to personal gain or give the Commissioner an improper advantage.
- 3. <u>Disclosure.</u> All actual and potential conflicts of interest shall be disclosed by Commissioners to the Bar President and Executive Director whenever a conflict arises.

4. <u>Violations of Policy.</u> Disinterested Commissioners shall make a determination as to whether a conflict exists and what subsequent action is appropriate (if any). The President shall inform the Commission of such determination and action. The Commission shall retain the right to modify or reverse such determination and action, and shall retain the ultimate enforcement authority with respect to the interpretation and application of this policy.

### UTAH STATE BAR YOUNG LAWYERS DIVISION

### **BYLAWS**

(Amended and restated June, 8 2016)

## ARTICLE I Name and Purpose

- 1.1 Name. This organization shall be named the Young Lawyers Division of the Utah State Bar.
- 1.2 Purpose. The primary purpose of the Division shall be to further the mission of the Utah State Bar, particularly among younger and newer members, through continued education, professional development, leadership training, social activities, public service, and take such other functions deemed appropriate by Division members. The Division shall also serve as an affiliate of the American Bar Association Young Lawyer Division and any other affiliate organizations.

### ARTICLE II Members

- 2.1 Eligibility for Membership. Membership in the Division shall consist of all members of the Utah State Bar in good standing who are under thirty-six (36) years of age, or have been admitted to the practice of law in any state less than five (5) years.
- 2.2 Termination of Membership. Membership shall terminate automatically on June 30 after a member attains thirty-six (36) years of age, or five (5) years after admission to the practice of law in any state, whichever occurs last, except as set forth herein. This definition shall not affect the Utah Bar Commission's determination and fixation of annual license fees.
- **Voting.** Each member of the Division in good standing shall be entitled to one (1) vote on each matter put to a vote of the members.
- 2.4 Meeting of the Members. A meeting of the membership of the Division may be called by the President, upon approval of the Executive Council, at such time and place as the Executive Council may determine or upon the written petition of not less than ten members of the Division which meetings, when called, shall be held at such time and place as the Executive Council may determine.
- 2.5 Quorum for Meeting of the Members. Ten (10) percent of the current total members of the Division shall constitute a quorum of any meeting of the Division. All binding action of the Division shall be by a majority vote of the members present at any such meeting

- where a quorum is in attendance. Roberts Rules of Order shall guide the meeting but shall not be binding.
- 2.6 Action of Members Without Meeting. Any action that may be taken at a meeting of the Division members may be taken without a meeting if a majority of the Division members entitled to vote consent to such action in writing. The procedures for such action shall be such as the Executive Council may establish from time to time, subject to applicable law.
- 2.7 Proxy Voting. Proxy voting shall not be allowed at Division meetings.

## ARTICLE III Board of Directors

- Governance. The main governing body of the Division shall be the Board of Directors ("the Board"), which shall consist of not less than fifteen (15) or more than thirty (30) members, not including the Executive Council. Except as otherwise provided by these Bylaws, all policymaking authority within the Division resides in the Board.
- Board Members. Except as otherwise provided herein, members of the Board shall be appointed by the President with the advice and consent of the Executive Council. All Board members shall be designated as a director of a program ("Director") or a liaison to another program or association related to the mission of the Division ("Liaison"). Officers may hold more than one position at a time but no more than one person may occupy the same office or offices at the same time.
- Board unless he or she is a member in good standing of the Division and can continue as a member of the Division without "aging-out" during his or her term. If a Board member "ages-out" during his or her term, he or she may continue to serve until a replacement is appointed.
- 3.4 Term of Office. The term of office for a Director or Liaison shall run from the time of appointment until June 30 or until a replacement is appointed.
- Powers and Duties. Board members shall have general supervision of the affairs of the Division, subject to the provisions of the Bylaws of the Utah State Bar. All members of the Board shall attend all regular Board meetings. In the event that a Board member cannot attend a regularly scheduled board meeting, he or she shall communicate the reason for his or her absence to the President in advance of the meeting. All Board members shall be entitled to one (1) vote on each matter put to a vote of the Board.
  - 3.5.1 Powers and Duties of Directors. In addition to the general powers and duties set forth herein, a Director shall have the power to direct one or more programs of the Division. A Director shall also have the power to appoint a committee of qualified individuals to support him or her in the coordination of the program or programs he or she directs.

- 3.5.2 Powers and Duties of Liaisons. In addition to the general powers and duties set forth herein, a Liaison shall have the power to represent the Division to one or more other programs or associations related to the mission of the Division.
- 3.6 Regular Meetings. The Board shall hold at least nine (9) regular meetings each year at such time and place as set by the President. All regular meetings shall be open to Division members and to the public.
- 3.7 Special Meetings. Special meetings of the Board may be called by the President or any three Executive Cabinet officers and held at such place as the President or Executive Council may determine. Reasonable notice of a special meeting shall be given by email, telephone, and any other means as the Executive Council may determine. All special meetings shall be open to public unless otherwise specified. No members of the Division may be denied entry to any Board meeting.
- **Quorum for Board Meetings.** A majority of the Board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business at any meeting of the Board; but if less than a majority of the Board members is present at any meeting, a majority of the Board members present may adjourn the meeting.
- 3.9 Vacancies on the Board. A vacancy in a Director or Liaison position occurs when a director resigns or is dismissed by the President with the advice and consent of the Executive Council. A Vacancy may be filled by appointment by the President with the advice and consent of the Executive Council.

## ARTICLE IV Executive Council

- **Executive Council Officers.** The Executive Council shall consist of the President, President-Elect, Immediate Past President, Secretary, Treasurer, and Publicity Manager.
- 4.2 Eligibility for Executive Council Office. No person shall be eligible for an Executive Council office unless he or she is a member in good standing of the Division and can continue as a member of the Division without "aging-out" during his or her term. The only exception shall be for the Immediate Past President who shall continue to serve until the end of his or her term despite having "aged-out" of the Division.
- 4.3 Term of Office. The term of office shall for all Executive Council offices shall begin at the close of the Utah Bar Annual Summer Convention or July 1, whichever occurs later, and end at the close of the following Utah Bar Summer Convention or until June 30, whichever occurs later.
- 4.4 Election and Succession. The President-Elect, Secretary, Treasurer, and Publicity Manager shall be elected annually by a majority vote of all ballots cast by members of the Division. On or before May 1, members of the Division shall be notified of Executive Council offices up for election. Declarations of candidacy for each elected office shall be

submitted on or before May 15. The time period for voting and the announcement of election results shall be determined by a majority vote of the Executive Council, so long as the results of the election are declared no later than May 31. The office of President shall devolve upon the President-Elect once his or her term of office ends. The office of Immediate Past President shall devolve upon the President once his or her term of office ends.

- 4.5 Powers and Duties. Executive Council officers shall carry out the duties of his or her office as set forth herein. All Executive Council members shall be members of the Board. All Executive Council members shall be entitled to one (1) vote on each matter put to a vote of the Board and one (1) vote on each matter put to a vote of the Executive Counsel with the exception of the Immediate Past President, who shall be an ex officio member of the Board and the Executive Council.
  - **4.5.1 President.** The President has the chief executive powers of the Division. The President shall:
    - a. Have general charge of the affairs and management of the Division;
    - b. Preside at all meetings of the Division, Board, and Executive Council and shall determine the agenda and the order of business to be transacted at any meeting thereof;
    - c. Provide a report to the Board and the Executive Council at all regular meetings;
    - d. Appoint members of the Board as set forth herein;
    - e. Represent the Division as an ex officio member of the Utah Bar Commissioners;
    - f. Select from the members of the Division the delegation to any national or regional conferences in which the Young Lawyers Division is an affiliate member; and
    - g. Perform any other duties incident to his or her office.
  - **4.5.2 President-Elect.** The President-Elect is the vice president of the Division. The President-Elect shall:
    - a. Temporarily assume the duties of the president in the event of his or her absence, temporary disability, or failure to act until the President resumes his or her duties;
    - b. In the event of a permanent vacancy, automatically succeed the President for the remainder of his or her term of office (early succession to the office

- of the President shall have no effect on the term or regular succession of the President-Elect);
- c. Prepare and submit the Division's proposed budget for upcoming fiscal year by June 1;
- d. Obtain preliminary approval of proposed budget for the Division by a majority vote of the incoming Executive Council officers prior to submitting the same to the Utah Bar Commission for final approval at the Utah Bar Commission's next regular meeting; and
- e. Perform any other duties incident to his or her office.
- **4.5.3 Immediate Past President.** The Immediate Past President is the individual who last served a full term as President. The Immediate Past President shall:
  - a. Make himself or herself available to the Board and Executive Council for consultation regarding all matters concerning the Division;
  - b. Perform such other duties as may be assigned to him or her by the President; and
  - c. Perform any other duties incident to his or her office.
- **4.5.4** Secretary. The Secretary has the chief administrative powers of the Division. The Secretary shall:
  - a. Maintain custody of all records of the Division;
  - b. Provide a report to the Board and the Executive Council at all regular meetings;
  - c. Compile, maintain, and distribute a contact list of all Executive Council officers and Board members to be distributed to the same;
  - d. Distribute meeting materials to all Board members in advance of all Board and Executive Council meetings and keep the minutes of all Board and Executive Council meetings;
  - e. Facilitate all elections of the Division, subject to the provisions herein;
  - f. As needed, and upon the approval of Executive Council, establish record-keeping and elections policies on behalf of the Division; and
  - g. Perform any other duties incident to his or her office.

- **4.5.5 Treasurer.** The Treasurer has the financial control powers of the Division. The Treasurer shall:
  - a. Maintain custody the budget and all financial records of the Division;
  - b. Provide a report to the Board and the Executive Council at all regular meetings;
  - c. Facilitate all finical transactions of the Division, with the approval of the President and subject to the provisions herein;
  - d. As needed and upon the approval of Executive Council, establish expenditure and reimbursement policies on behalf of the Division; and
  - e. Perform any other duties incident to his or her office.
- **4.5.6 Publicity Manager.** The Publicity Manager has the chief communications powers of the Division. The Publicity Manager shall:
  - a. Maintain all publications, web content, email accounts, social media accounts, and Utah Bar Journal submissions of the Division;
  - b. Provide a report to the Board and the Executive Council at all regular meetings;
  - Facilitate all external marketing and publicity on behalf of the Division;
  - d. As needed and upon the approval of Executive Council, establish email and public relations policies on behalf of the Division; and
  - e. Perform any other duties incident to his or her office.
- 4.6 Executive Council Meetings. Meetings of the Executive Council shall be called as needed by the President or by any three Executive Cabinet officers and shall be held at such place as the President or Executive Council may determine. Reasonable notice must be given for all Executive Council meetings. All Executive Council Officers shall be entitled to one vote on each matter submitted to a vote. A majority vote of the Executive Officers is required on all actions taken on behalf of the Executive Council, unless otherwise specified.
- 4.7 Removal of Executive Council Officers. Any three Executive Council officers, may petition in writing for the removal of another Executive Council officer. The Petition for Removal shall set forth the reasons for the request of removal. Upon receipt of the Petition for Removal, the President shall send a written notice to the Board that removal of a particular Executive Council officer has been requested, along with a copy of the Petition for Removal. Notice that an action to remove an Executive Council officer, along

with a copy of the Petition for Removal, must be provided to the Executive Council officer that is the subject of the Petition for Removal no less than thirty (30) days prior to the meeting at which such action will be considered by the Executive Council and the Board. The Executive Council officer that is the subject of the Petition for Removal must be given the opportunity to respond to the Petition for Removal prior to any vote on the matter. Other Executive Council officers and Board members may speak in favor of or against removal. At the conclusion of the discussion, a vote shall be taken by written ballot. The Executive Council officer that is the subject of the Petition for Removal shall be removed only upon a vote of good cause by a three-quarters (3/4) vote of the Executive Council and a simple majority vote of the Board. Removal is effective immediately.

4.8 Vacancies on the Executive Council. A vacancy in an Executive Council office occurs when an officer resigns or is removed from office. A vacancy in the office of President shall be filled by the President-Elect, as set forth herein. A vacancy in the office of President-Elect shall filled by any other member of the Executive Council appointed by the President; however, the appointed officer shall only assume the vice presidential duties of the position and shall not succeed the President as President-Elect. A vacancy in the office of Secretary, Treasurer, or Publicity Manager shall be filled by a majority of all ballots cast by members of the Division.

## ARTICLE V Affiliate Positions

- 5.1 ABA District Representative. Vacancies in the ABA District Representative for District 27 (Utah and Nevada) shall alternate each year between Utah and Nevada. In years in which Utah has the nomination, the ABA District Representative shall be nominated and selected in accordance with the requirements set forth in the Bylaws of the Young Lawyers Division of the American Bar Association. Nominees for this position shall meet all eligibility requirements set forth by the Young Lawyers Division of the American Bar Association.
- ABA Young Lawyer Delegate. Vacancies in the ABA Young Lawyer Delegate position shall be filled by the Board and the Utah Bar Commission. When a vacancy occurs, the Board shall solicit letters of interest in the position from members of the Division. The Board shall select from the letters submitted three (3) qualified nominees to the Utah Bar Commission for appointment to the ABA House of Delegates. Nominees for this position shall meet all eligibility requirements set forth by the American Bar Association.

### ARTICLE VI Miscellaneous Provisions

6.1 Compensation. No salary or compensation for services shall be paid to or by any Board member, Executive Counsel officer, or committee member, except as may be specifically authorized by the Utah Bar Commissioner. Nothing in this provision shall limit the ability of Board members, Executive Counsel officers, or committee members from receiving

reimbursement for valid, verified expenses incurred as part of his or her duties, subject to the provisions herein and in any subsequent policies of the Division or the Utah State Bar.

- 6.2 Supplemental Authority. The Division, through the procedures set forth herein, may make rules or adopt policies and procedures that supplement these Bylaws which shall be binding upon the division for the period specified by the same.
- 6.3 Antidiscrimination. The Division shall not discriminate, and shall actively oppose discrimination, on the basis of ancestry, color or race, cultural or ethnic background, national or regional origin, economic status, political affiliation, marital or parental status, physical disability, religion, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity or expression, and kind or size of legal practice.
- **Division Activities and Events.** Reasonable efforts should be made to account for the geographical locations of the Division's various activities and events throughout the State of Utah to encourage participation by young lawyers in areas outside the Salt Lake Valley.

## ARTICLE VII Amendments

- 7.1 Preliminary Approval. These Bylaws may be amended by a majority vote of the Executive Council and a majority vote of the Board.
- 7.2 Final Approval. Amendments to these Bylaws must be submitted for final approval to the Utah Bar Commissioners by the President within fourteen (14) working days of passage by the Executive Counsel and Board.

### Motion Amending and Restating the Bylaws of the Young Lawyers Division

On the Maday of June, 2016, at duly and properly scheduled meeting of the Board of Directors, wherein a quorum was present, a motion made to amend and restate the Bylaws of the Young Lawyers Division of the Utah State Bar, which passed by a vote of aye votes, and abstentions. A complete and accurate copy of these amended and restated Bylaws are attached above.

### Certification by Officers

### POSITION DESCRIPTION

TITLE: Bar Commissioner

**REPORTS TO:** Bar President and Constituents

**EFFECTIVE DATE:** July 2015

### **Basic Functions:**

1. Serves as member of Board of Bar Commissioners in establishing policies to fulfill obligations of the Bar as indicated under the Utah Supreme Court's Rules for Integration and Management and under the Bar's Bylaws and Commission's Policies and Procedures.

- 2. With Bar Commission, adopts yearly budget for operations and capital.
- 3. Works towards fulfilling vision of the Bar, which is: "A just legal system that is understood, valued, and accessible to all."
- 4. Strives to uphold mission of the Bar, which is: "Lawyers serving the public and legal profession with excellence, civility, and integrity."
- 5. Attends regularly scheduled Commission meetings, including those associated with Annual and Spring Bar Conventions.
- 6. Serves on various Commission committees, which may include admissions related reviews, *ad hoc* study or governance committees, long range planning, budget and finance, executive committee, program review committees, or others as assigned.
- 7. Serves as liaison with sections, committees, and local bars as assigned by Bar President. In this capacity, each commissioner should: (a) call his or her assigned sections, committees and local bars at least once a month; (b) attend at least one meeting for each of his or her assigned sections, committees and local bars per quarter; and (c) provide a status report to the Commission as requested by the President.
- 8. Attends, if possible, admissions ceremonies and Bar socials.
- 9. Communicates with lawyers in division and reports on Bar activities and receives input for communication to the Commission.
- 10. Contacts local state senators and representatives on issues of Bar interests within legislative policies.

### **Summary of Bar Commission Reimbursement Policies**

### 1. Commission Meetings.

- (a) **Mileage or airfare**, if necessary, for distant meetings if they are held far enough from your office to make reimbursement appropriate (i.e., travel from Logan, St. George, or Provo to Salt Lake City, or *vice versa*), and:
- (b) **Lodging** for those who must travel some distance (i.e., travel from Logan, St. George to meetings in Salt Lake City, etc.).

### 2. Commission Meetings held at Spring Convention.

- (a) Mileage plus tolls and parking or, reasonable airfare;
- (b) Standard per diem for two day's meals, incidentals, and gratuities;
- (c) Two night's lodging in a standard room in the convention hotel, and;
- (d) Rental car, if necessary.

### 3. Commission Meetings held at Summer Convention.

- (a) Mileage plus tolls and parking or, reasonable airfare;
- (b) Standard per diem for three day's meals, incidentals, and gratuities;
- (c) Three night's lodging in a standard room in the convention hotel, and;
- (d) Rental car, if necessary.

### 4. Worthwhile Educational Opportunities.

At the discretion of the Bar President and pursuant to approved travel budgets:

- (a) Mileage plus tolls and parking or, reasonable airfare;
- (b) Meals, incidentals, and gratuities while traveling to and at the event;
- (c) Lodging at the event hotel, and;
- (d) Rental car, if necessary.

### 5. Other General Office Expenses.

With the advance approval of the Bar President:

(a) **Telephone**, **postage**, **supplies**, **copying**, and other similar expenses, but *not* expenses for secretarial or clerical assistance.

### 6. Procedures for Receiving Reimbursement.

- (a) **Spring and Summer Convention.** Reimbursement for Commission Meetings held at the Spring and Summer Conventions will be solicited by the Bar's Executive Secretary via e-mail immediately after the conventions. Commissioners indicating a desire for reimbursement will be reimbursed for lodging, per diem, and mileage at standard rates.
- (b) Reimbursement for other travel will require supporting documentation.

# UTAH STATE BAR Budget and Finance Committee Highlights of the May 2016 Financial Statements

### **FINANCIAL STATEMENT HIGHLIGHTS**

<u>Year-to-Date (YTD) Net Profit – Accrual Basis</u>: YTD net profit is \$955,000, \$402,000 ahead of budget, mainly due to higher than budgeted Licensing, Admissions, CLE, Summer Convention and Member Services revenue, offset by lower than anticipated Fall Forum and Facilities revenue. Overall expenses are just under budget, with some departments (CLE and Bar Operations) running over budget and others (Summer Convention, Member Services and Facilities) running under. Though it is expected that the gap between actual and budgeted net profit will narrow with increased event activity in June, net profit for the year is projected to exceed budget.

YTD Net Profit — Cash Basis: Adding back YTD depreciation of \$206,000, YTD net profit is \$1.2 million, \$401,000 ahead of budget.

<u>Licensing</u>: Licensing revenue is at 102% of budget with revenue totaling \$4.2 million. One of the bigger contributors to higher than budgeted revenue is late fees which exceed budget by \$30k. Licensing expenses are under budget by \$27k mainly due to lower than budgeted salaries and benefits, a factor of personnel changes this year. There are 86 more active attorneys than last year at this time and 55 fewer inactive attorneys (net increase of 31).

Admissions: Admissions revenue is at 119% of the YTD budget (and 113% of the full year's budget) with revenue totaling \$517k. Exam, retake, laptop, motion, house counsel and late fee revenue all exceed budget. Admissions expenses are slightly over budget due mainly to higher expenses for exam questions and meeting costs.

**NLTP**: NLTP revenue is at 88% of the YTD budget and 78% of the total budget for the year. The program is expected to break even by the end of the fiscal year.

**OPC:** OPC spending is slightly above the YTD budget mainly due to higher salaries and benefit expenses.

<u>CLE</u>: YTD CLE revenue and expenses are at 120% and 140% of YTD budget, respectively, due to more events taking place than factored in the budget.

<u>Summer Convention:</u> The Summer Convention YTD net loss is \$23k compared to the YTD budgeted net loss of \$106k. Summer Convention revenue exceeded budget by \$40k due to paying attendees up 36% relative to budget. Expenses were under budget by \$43k due to improved cost control for the Sun Valley event.

**Fall Forum:** The Fall Forum YTD net loss is \$23k compared to the YTD budgeted net profit of \$984 mainly due to lower than expected attendance and higher expenses at Grand America.

# UTAH STATE BAR Budget and Finance Committee Highlights of the May 2016 Financial Statements

<u>Spring Convention:</u> The Spring Convention YTD profit is \$37k compared to YTD budgeted net profit of \$16k due to higher registration revenue and lower than budgeted expenses (mainly staff salaries).

Member Services: Though the YTD net loss from Member Services favorably compares to budget by \$209k, much of the difference is due to a timing difference between when the section administrative fees were booked (February and May) relative to when they were budgeted (June). In other words, the fees paid by sections for administrative support provided by the Bar were booked earlier than budgeted which is inflating YTD revenue compared to budget. This timing difference will resolve itself by the end of the fiscal year. Member Services expenses are lower than budget due to significantly lower legislative and advertising spending this year and lower than budgeted copy/printing expenses associated with the Bar Journal.

<u>Public Services:</u> Public services YTD net loss of (\$388k) is at 93% of budget due mainly to lower salaries and benefits in Committees. Spending for Consumer Assistance, Access to Justice and Tuesday Night Bar is on track relative to budget.

<u>Bar Operations:</u> Bar Operations YTD net loss of (\$1,243k) is at 105% of budget. Though investment income is higher than budgeted by approximately \$22k, it is offset by higher salaries and benefits which result from one additional headcount, additional CFO expenses, and more staff time being charged to the Bar Management dept.

Facilities: Facilities net loss for the year is at (\$225k) or 89% of budget. There have been 167 (11%) fewer events held at the Law & Justice Center this year compared to last resulting in lower facilities revenue of approximately \$30k. Expenses are under budget by \$59k due also to fewer events and to lower general and administrative expenses (office supplies, postage/mailing, and copy/printing expenses).

# Editorial: Ethnic, gender diversity is for the benefit of all

Just as a new report warned that Utah's judiciary is not reflective of the state's ethnic and gender makeup, the most important court in the land ruled — again — that creating an ethnically diverse upper class is a worthy effort because it benefits all Americans, not just members of a group who previously have been left behind.

Too often, affirmative action policies in universities and workplaces are derided as an unfair, even condescending, attempt to be kind to blacks, Hispanics, women or other groups of people who have not always had the same opportunities as white males to reach the upper echelons of society.

But the point of those efforts is not to do a favor for an individual person. It is to build a culture that, even in its lofty positions of power, reflects the composition of the whole society. Such efforts give the ruling class and its institutions — legislative, executive, judicial and academic — the legitimacy they need to carry out their duties.

The U.S. Supreme Court ruled last Thursday that the ongoing efforts of the University of Texas to admit a mix of students that reflects the state as a whole have a legitimate academic purpose. That the school's affirmative action program benefits all students, not just those who had the personal benefit of being brought into a system they otherwise might have be left out of, by educating them in the same kind of ethnically diverse atmosphere that they will soon be living in, working in and, in many cases, called to lead.

That is why the state of Utah should be concerned that, according to a recent analysis by the American Constitutional Society for Law and Policy, our state comes in last among the states in having a judiciary that matches its population.

While white men make up 38 percent of Utah's population, they hold 79 percent of the judgeships. White women are 40 percent of the population, yet sit in only 13 percent of the seats on the state bench.

The status quo has been defended with the idea that Utah deserves the best judges, selected without concern for their race or gender. But the judiciary as a whole will not be as qualified, as just and as respected — will not be the best — as long as it is so far out of kilter with the state as a whole.

A judiciary that looks like Utah — a state where one in seven of us are Hispanic — would serve a purpose that has nothing to do with tokenism and everything to do with dispensing justice that will be widely recognized as such.

The rulings of white male judges are much more likely to be — and be accepted as — truly just if those jurists go to college, graduate law school and attend judicial conferences with peers of all colors and shapes.

Those human interactions inform every field of study, especially the law and public service, more than any textbook or case study. That is why efforts to diversify benefit everyone, and must be continued.

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
